AND SO WE GO INTO ICELAND

Not at all surprising is the move by which American naval forces take over the protection of Iceland. It is only a little less surprising than if we were to move into the Cape Verde islands or Dakar. It is entirely in keeping with President Roosevelt's own method of taking us to this war, or rather into the actual fighting of this war. Now the American public may understand why last week Navy Secretary Knox was suggesting that we should strike in the Atlantic while Germany is occupied in Russia. Once more, President Roosevelt is inviting "the incident" which the Germans (except in the case of the Robin Moore) have sought to avoid. The Germans have threatened to shoot at any ships which move across the blockade zones they have declared. Now we have moved across the last imaginary line and in effect dare them to come on.

At the risk of repeating till we weary our readers we will say once more that we do not like President Roosevelt's method of leading us to war. It lacks truthfulness. It is not worthy a great and courageous nation. Nevertheless the occupation of Iceland is another step in the right direction. If Hitler must be smashed before we can start reconstructing a world for justice and democracy, the sooner we get down to business the sooner it will be over, and in military terms, prompt action usually means the saving of much blood and treasure. It is difficult to see how the Germans can any longer ignore the defiance of their blockade. The sooner our part in this war becomes a fact which the people can recognize, the sooner we will have real unity in thought and action.

There are many pieces to the picture puzzle. It may turn out that the mysterious "war" between Peru and Ecuador is not entirely disconnected from events elsewhere. This may be one of the first moves of the German colonists and secret agents in Latin America to create so much turmoil in the western hemisphere that we will not be free for positive interference in Europe. Both the Iceland move and the war in South America may have been in mind the other day when General Marshall begged Congress to remove the shackles which limit the use of our troops to wars on this continent, or in our own possessions.

By all means Congress should comply with the request of General Marshall—and without political quibbling or delay. We have gone too far into this war now for any half measures. Our only defense now will be a swift and smashing aggressive at whatever spot Germany seems most vulnerable. To put legislative limits on military decisions is one way of committing national suicide. We are at war (and it should be acknowledged by Congress with proper declaration) but there should be no tinkering now with military decisions.

We are in Iceland. Tomorrow's moves no man can foretell but we must be free to go.

THESE ARE SOLDIERS—AND GENTLEMEN!

To those familiar with the ways of the American army, it is not surprising to find that our soldier visitors are exceedingly well mannered and behaved. To the few who may have carried over some of the prejudices about men in service we call attention to the soldiers of the Forty-First and Third Divisions as gentlemen.

At the rate of 4,000 to 5,000 a night they have been camping in our city. They have joined in our games, danced with our women; they have been in and around our homes, our clubs, our hotels, shops, restaurants, bar-rooms (yeh, barrooms!). If there has been a single serious case of rowdiness we have not been able to find when or where it happened. There has been no conflict with civilians. If anything, soldier handling of traffic suggests improvement in our methods.

Now we do not contend that every single soldier stayed stony sober or that every silly girl found every soldier pure in thought and deed, a Sir Galahad. You will notice we used the adjective "silly" and the silly ones in Eugene, as elsewhere usually get what they are looking for. Point is that in the main the conduct of the soldiers has been above reproach and if there have been departures from rigid decorum they have NOT BEEN FLAUNTED to the annoyance and discomfort of other people.

Compare, for instance, the behavior of our soldier visitors with that of any convention that has come to Eugene, or any big student rally or alumni homecoming. We do not

nominate the soldiers for any angelic honors. In fact we have no illusions about them. They are under discipline. They are furthermore men proud of the uniforms they wear.

And they are, above all, like the rest of us very human beings, young men a long way from home but from homes just like other people's, responsive to a friendly welcome, decent by preference and by instinct. There probably will be many soldiers from many different divisions bivouaching here as time goes on, and you may be at ease for they will all be, in the main soldiers and gentlemen.

Mr. Sokolsky has written considerably about Japan and knows the country very well. But apparently he does not know Oregon educational institutions. Matsuoaka was a student at Oregon University not at Oregon State college. But even at that, he shouldn't seek revenge on all the United States. He probably, too, saw whites snubbed at that snobbish institution. If he wants to get even with the university for "humiliating treatment which left its mark on his sensitive soul," let him send some fast, husky Japs to Oregon State who will be out-standers on the first string football team. At any rate, Liberty loves Oregon State an apology and a correction. That we should be dragged into war with Japan because one of her citizens was mistreated at the University is too big a responsibility for even the college to take.

No doubt before the college would dare to enter a protest to Liberty, it would have to get the consent of the Chavory who would take the matter up with the board of higher education who would refer it to a committee to report back to the board which would take the matter under advisement till the university politicians could devise a way to hang the war onto the college when it would be used as an excuse for giving the university a course leading to a degree in science or possibly the abolition of the college altogether as a punishment for the university getting into war with Japan. Other courses have been given to the university since the "consolidation" with far less reason or excuse than that.

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8.—Rapidly the picture is unfolding of what the citizens of Oregon will soon be paying to meet some of the lend-lease bills and national defense. The personal income tax will not be collected until next March on this year's income, but a long list of taxes will be imposed and collected as soon as the tax bill can be enacted.

It is safe to say that the individual income taxes in Oregon collected on 1941 income will exceed \$9,000,000 (collections in 1940 were some \$3,574,943); corporate taxes will be higher than that sum.

The federal government will collect \$2,250,000 from Oregon motorists plus \$120,000 from truck operators. This will be all new money and will come from the levy of \$5 a car; same as the annual fee charged by the state. A government tax on all automobiles (there were 32,452,881 in the United States in 1940) is a painful novelty. There are 7,733 motorboats registered in Portland and these will be subject to the \$5 tax, or another \$36,663 of new money.

Oregon state liquor commission will have to pay another \$1 a gallon for distilled spirits, which of course, will be paid by consumers. This will increase price of liquor 25 cents a quart, or 20 cents for a fifth of a gallon of Scotch. The commission sent a representative to the national capital to protest that an increased liquor tax would bring back the bootlegger, but after arriving here the representative discovered that it was useless to try to talk the ways and means committee out of the notion. Tax on wines will be double the present impost. This will probably affect the business of wine stores in Portland.

At the end of the month the consumer will be charged 5 per cent tax on the amount of his telephone bill. Oregon has successfully resisted a sales tax each time it was proposed, but Uncle Sam has his own sales tax; he will charge 5 per cent on gum and candy and to make certain the kiddies pay their share of the tax burden an admission tax is laid on all tickets down to 9 cents. Possibly the movies will absorb the tax on tickets sold the youngsters for Friday nights and Saturdays. Cigar stores are "tight" giving away matches, ditto hotels and other establishments which use paper matches for advertising purposes, for these matches will be taxed 2 cents per 1000.

Despite protests from Oregon that a musical instrument is not a luxury, the ways and means committee has decided these instruments should be subject to a 10 per cent tax, the same as the tax placed on jewelry.

A real soaker, however, is the 5 per cent on railroad, airplane, bus and steamer tickets. Any ticket costing more than 35 cents (a commuters' ticket) will have the 5 per cent added.

A flat 10 per cent tax will be collected on radio parts (already taxed 5.5 per cent) and the same amount on phonograph records. Wishing to be big hearted, the committee exempts from taxation all automobiles operated by the federal government, state owned machines, and those of counties and cities. These total, in Oregon, several thousand. Nor will the committee advocate an increase of the 1.5 cents a gallon tax on gasoline, nor current taxes on tobacco, sugar, tea or coffee, although the treasury thought here was a source of revenue to be tapped. However, long distance phone calls will cost more than ever and the tax on telegrams (including birthday greetings sung or unsung) has been upped.

Undecided yet is whether a tax should be placed on the dog races in Portland. The pari-mutuels take a cut from the betting and turn the rest over to the state of Oregon. A somewhat similar arrangement is in vogue in other states. Banned as iniquitous in many states is the slot machine and the committee expects to decide shortly what to do about them. Juke boxes are still exempt but patrons of such night clubs as exist in Oregon will have to pay a tax on top of their bill. Just what constitutes a night club is a problem but the committee is wrestling with a definition; perhaps any place where there is eating and dancing, there being no drinks sold retail in Oregon.

Answer to the Oregon-Washington-California Pear League, which has protested winter pears from the Argentine, is the statement by the state department that approximately 332,000 boxes came from Argentina this year whereas the producers in the three western states had 3,821,883 boxes of the six leading varieties. The importation was less than 9 per cent. Trouble with the west coast producers, observes the department, is that they fail to market enough in the winter months. The answer will not be satisfactory to the Rogue river valley nor the Hood river valley growers.
