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Seed Growers Set Meeting Wednesday

An important meeting of seed growers will be held in Junction City grange hall next Wednesday evening, July 16, at 8 o'clock, announces O. S. Fletcher, county agent. The meeting is arranged by the Lane County Agricultural Conservation association and the county agent. This is a bad time of year to call a meeting of farmers, who are starting harvest, but there are some problems of seed growers that should be discussed at this time, it is pointed out by Mr. Fletcher. The program for the Junction City meeting follows: Discussion of schedule of prices, methods of procedure for AAA purchases this year of vetches, peas and ryegrass. (This will be an opportunity to get the latest information on grades, purity, and different types of crops that will be purchased by AAA).

Procedure for Willamette vetch certification: (This is of the utmost importance to Willamette vetch growers. For instance, vetch will have to be tagged before it leaves the farm and should be tagged before it leaves the field. If it is moved from the farm before being tagged it will not be further considered for certification). Explanation of Oregon Seed Growers League—why it was organized and what it expects to do. Any local seed matters that should be discussed.
