Army Creates Aerial Support Commands

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(U.S.)—The army today created five air support commands in a major step to coordinate the activities of aviation units and ground forces along the pattern used by Germany.

The new support commands will include observation aircraft, light bombers, photography planes, gliders, and air transports for parachute and air-landing troops, as well as all other aviation elements needed by the ground forces in carrying out efforts to obtain air superiority.

Under the program, the first four new commands will operate with each of the four field armies. They will be under control of the air forces of the combat command of the GHQ. The fifth support command will operate under the GHQ command to assure mobility, and will be utilized by the armored force. Headquarters of each command has not been selected.

New Property Seizure Measure Turned Down

WASHINGTON—July 29.—(U.S.)—The house refused today to approve the compromise form of legislation which would authorize the president to take over industrial plants when interruptions of production impede or delay the defense program.

The measure, including provision for deferment from the draft of men 28 years old and more, was returned to a conference committee, composed of senators and representatives, on motion of Rep. Healey (D-Mass.)

President Defends Good Neighbor Policy

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(U.S.)—President Roosevelt said today he hoped none of our friends in Latin America would take seriously the statement of Senator Clark (D., Idaho) that the good neighbor policy had been a failure and that the United States should take over the Latin American nations and Canada.

In response to a press conference question, Mr. Roosevelt said he had read Clark's words in the newspapers. He then expressed the hope no one would take them seriously.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(U.S.)—Senator Clark (D., Ida.), speaking as an individual senator, suggested today that the United States "take over control" of all Latin America and Canada but a colleague immediately branded the idea as fantastic.

Senator O'Mahoney (D., Wyo.) said he was sure no one in the western part of this country would support the suggestion in calling the proposal both fantastic and imperialistic.

Clark, one of a senate group opposing administration policy, gave no intimation that he would offer legislation to carry out his theory.

But he said in an interview that "the good neighbor policy has been a failure" and that "instead of talking about sending soldiers to Europe we ought to think about using them here in our own hemisphere."

Draft Board Clerks To Meet On Campus

Clerks of selective service boards from 14 counties will gather at Chapman hall on the University of Oregon campus Aug. 2 and 3 to discuss problems in connection with mobilization of American manpower for the army and defense industries.

Col. Elmer V. Woolton, state selective service director, will preside over the two-day session. Saturday morning the clerks are scheduled to meet with representatives of the employment service, the NYA, WPA and other federal agencies.

The afternoon session will be devoted to selective service problems. Sunday morning a panel meeting will be held under the direction of Col. Woolton.

Peace Worker Visits In Eugene

William B. Lloyd, Jr., American director of "the campaign for world government," and member of the "group for peace and a united states of the world," was a visitor in Eugene, Tuesday, landing his private plane at the Eugene airport.

He is touring the west now especially in behalf of the house joint resolution 131, referred to the house committee on foreign affairs, the bill seeking to authorize an appropriation of \$50,000,000 for a joint congressional peace committee to "wage" a program of peace and a world convention. A private flier for 12 years, Lloyd is piloting his own plane on the trip.

From here he goes to Portland and Seattle, then back to Portland and on to Boise and Salt Lake city.

Tying in the work of his organization for a world government with the "V for Victory" campaign in Europe, Lloyd stated the program of his group gives the V campaign the content to make it a powerful force.

On this tour, Lloyd is giving talks and circulating petitions for the H.J.R. 131. On his plane in letters two feet high are the words "H. J. R. 131."

Tumble Creek Fire Out Of Danger

The troublesome Tumble creek snag fire in the Detroit ranger district of the Willamette national forest is practically out, J. R. Bruckart, forest supervisor, reported Tuesday.

The blaze, most dangerous of the approximately 200 started by lightning two weeks ago, burned over nearly 1200 acres. One hundred men are still patrolling the area, putting out smoldering embers, and falling snags.

Wednesday 40 of the crew are expected to be taken off.

The fire situation in general was good, according to the supervisor. All of the lightning fires, with the exception of Tumble Creek, are out.

Forest guards and smoke-chasers are returning to maintenance work and swapping stories of fire experiences. One ranger in the Detroit district, told about cutting down a five-foot thick snag with his "pulaski" a combination ax-mattock used by fire fighters.

He was gone for three days in the woods on the job, and felling the huge snag with the "pulaski."

Another ranger, Charles Rutherford, was out two days in the West Boundary district, doing a similar job on a 40-inch snag.

Jim Walker, Eastern Lane fire patrol warden, reported all 87 of the lightning fires in his area out, and operations back to normal.

Camp For Bean Pickers Operating

Nearly 100 bean harvesters are staying at the mobile FSA camp for migratory farm workers at Coburg, it was reported Tuesday by James Bagan, manager of the Eugene office of the Oregon state employment service.

More workers are expected to use the camp facilities later, he said.

Bean picking is getting underway all through the county. Demands for workers have been met satisfactorily up to the present time, although more harvesters could be placed.

Mr. Bagan said the peak of the crop was expected the first week in August. A definite labor shortage at that time has been predicted.

Literature, Life Topic For Club
Dr. Edward M. Hulme of Stanford university, teaching now at the University of Oregon summer session, talked to the Rotary club Tuesday noon on "Literature and Life." People can learn much from the great literature of the ages, the speaker commented. He sketched life as portrayed in literature from the Greek age to the present time.

Dr. Hulme described the ancient Greeks as advocating the perfect life on earth. The Middle Ages he designated as a period when men looked above them. They preached discouragement with life on earth. This principle had its repercussion in the Renaissance in Gothic spires and a philosophy of adventure.

Today, the speaker said, is a period in which men are seeking the brotherhood of man. Service clubs, he pointed out, preach brotherhood of man. If we do not learn to get along with one another now, there will be yet another world war, the speaker prophesied.

213 Enrolled For Post Session

Showing less decrease in enrollment than had been predicted—due to the call to army duty and work in defense industries—registration for the first day of post session at the University of Oregon Monday showed a total of 213, or about 19 per cent less than last year's enrollment at the end of the first day of 263.

"The decrease by percentage is considerably less than it was for the six-weeks session just opened," commented Dr. Dan E. Clark, director of summer sessions and head of the history department.

"We expect registration for this four-weeks term to run somewhere over 300; however," he said.

He pointed out that Wednesday is the last day on which students may enroll without paying the late registration fee.

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Horse Owner Groups Asked To Co-operate

The Lane county fair board is asking the various horse groups that use the fairgrounds to select one representative of their number to come before the fair board with definite recommendations of the use of the grounds as it affects their organization so that a program may be attempted that will coordinate these activities in such a manner that full use of the grounds and its facilities may be had.

Groups that have been contacted include the Eugene Hunt club, the Eugene Riding Academy, Sheriff's Posse, race horse owners, and private owners. The representative of each of these groups will be asked to meet with the fair board as soon as they have been selected.

Japanese Commerce With Malaya Stopped

SINGAPORE, July 28.—(U.S.)—Japanese commerce with British Malaya has been brought to a standstill by the freezing of Japanese funds, but the Japanese consul general, Ken Tsunumi, said the question of shipping was under consideration.

Japanese freighters have been carrying annually a million tons of iron ore and 20,000 tons of manganese from Japanese owned and operated mines on the Malay peninsula. No Japanese ships have been in harbor here since Saturday when the freezing order was issued.

Tsunumi said Tokyo had not ordered removal of Singapore's 2,000 Japanese. The American community, most of whom are engaged in the consular service, rubber purchasing and shipping, was carrying on normally. No removal order had come from Washington either.

BASE TO COST \$156,000
EMPIRE, July 29.—(U.S.)—Representative Mott has informed Coos bay officials that initial construction contracts for Empire's small craft navy base will total \$156,000. Work will start in autumn.
