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## World Today--

LONDON—Far Eastern tension over Thailand increases; Japanese reported massing striking force against Harbin and Korea; RAF again bombs Frankfurt, Mannheim and Karlsruhe and strikes at invasion coast.

BERLIN—Special communique reports Germans suffered only "moderate losses" in contrast to Russian casualties in battle of Smolensk; Luftwaffe again strikes heavily at Moscow industrial targets; acknowledge RAF raids on western and southwestern Germany.

MOSCOW—Fighting in Smolensk and Belaya Tserkov areas and on Estonian and Finnish fronts; claim heavy losses inflicted on German 112th and 59th tank regiments; report only one German plane penetrates Moscow's defenses during night.

ROME—Bruno Mussolini killed while testing new type plane near Pisa; RAF raids two Sicilian towns; claims hits by torpedo-planes on two British destroyers.

SHANGHAI—Report Japanese ask Russia to demilitarize Vladivostok and zone along Manchukuoan border, ask concessions in Siberia and Sakhalin island and guarantee U. S. will get no bases in Russia.

TOKYO—Spokesman says Japanese-Thailand relations peaceful and that British and American warnings against occupation of Thailand are unwarranted; Japan has second typhoon in month.

MELBOURNE—Navy minister says war or peace in Pacific depends on Japan.

## War Supplies Pledged Siam

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The United States and Great Britain have pledged war supplies to Thailand with which to resist Japanese aggression, informed quarters today.

The pledge served to emphasize their new warnings to Japan.

In parallel representations to the Thailand government, the United States and Britain urged it to take a firm stand against Japanese demands for military bases, it was said.

While American aid would be limited to war supplies, it is understood that the British had promised full military support, including troops. A Japanese thrust into Thailand would threaten British Burma and the naval base at Singapore.

## Speed Ordinance Adopted At Junction

JUNCTION CITY, Aug. 7.—(Special)—City council met Tuesday evening in regular session. Routine business was enacted. The speed ordinance was given its third reading and was adopted by the council. This ordinance conforms with the state speed law.

The sale of 5 13-100 acres of the city dump ground to Arnold Tracer, was authorized. A communication was read from the Oregon State defense commission recommending that the city organize a police reserve to work with the defense council during the emergency. Acting on the mayor's recommendation the council voted to organize a police reserve of ten men to work with the police chief; the men to be appointed by the mayor and police chief Sorensen.

The garbage disposal was up for considerable discussion and council voted to take over garbage disposal, to be placed under the supervision of city street man, Alfred Borgard, street and alley committeemen, Rasmussen and Phillips will work out a schedule. City street man will carry the key to the dump ground, a private citizen will be required to have a permit to dump garbage. The council was unanimous in approving Mayor Nelson's action in sending Junction City fire equipment to the aid of Glenwood in their recent fire disaster.

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## Youths Held For Murder

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Two 'teen age boys, described by Sheriff H. P. Gleason as "the most matter-of-fact little scoundrels I have ever seen," have confessed their part in the killing of an aged grocer during a robbery attempt a week ago.

The members of the juvenile gang were identified by Assistant District Attorney Richard Chamberlain as George Lingenfelter and Warren Brill, each 14 and of Hayward, where the slaying occurred.

They were arrested, Chamberlain said, on information furnished by Everett Washburn, 16, and Walter Lee 15, who were arrested in Ogden, Utah, whence they fled on a freight train.

Washburn and Lee confessed yesterday to a California district attorney.

Chamberlain said that according to the combined confessions Washburn shot William Hanna, the grocer, in the back with a pistol as he stood telephoning for help; Lee clubbed Hanna's wife, Emma, with the butt of a rifle; Brill drove the getaway car, and Lingenfelter provided the weapons, although he did not participate in the actual holdup and killing.

## Burma Defense Plan Is Ready

LONDON, Aug. 7.—(AP)—A Reuters dispatch from Singapore today quoted the Singapore office of the ministry of information as declaring that "in Burma and South China all preparations are ready to smash any Japanese attempt to cut the Burma road or move further westward."

This apparently referred to the possibility of a Japanese move into Thailand from bases in Indo-China or an attempt to invade China's southwestern province of Yunnan, through which the Burma road, chief supply line of the Chinese armies, runs.
