

Bean Pickers Parade To Fields

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ers plant. At the peak of harvest time it is expected that nearly 240 tons per day will arrive.

The cannery is still operating with two shifts on beans, but expects to add the third shift this week.

In operation this year for the first time is an FSA mobile camp for migratory workers. Located just outside of Coburg, in the heart of the bean area, it is already populated by several hundred workers.

Complete "City"

The little tent community, laid out neatly in a stubble-field, is a complete "city" with water, lights, a tiny "hospital," and a government of the workers themselves.

Levi B. Williams is manager of the unit for the FSA. Already nearly 100 tents have been put up, and more are being erected as the pickers arrive.

Sanitary facilities, showers, provisions for children too young to go to the fields, a recreation center, are provided for the workers. A sub-station of the employment service is maintained at the camp, directing the harvesters to the fields where pickers are needed.

Medical attention is provided for all migratory workers in the area, even though they are not staying at the camp.

Pickers Needed

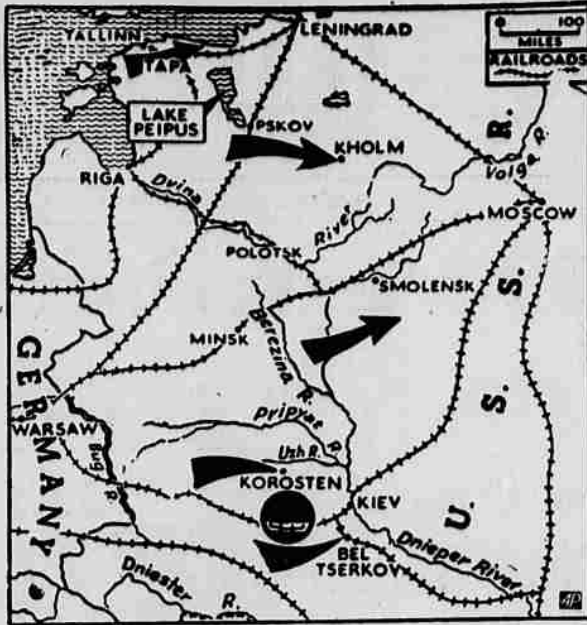
More pickers are still needed for the harvest, according to James Bagan, manager of the employment service office here. Estimates, based on a need of 10 pickers per acre, indicate that at least 10,000 individuals will be required. The manager indicated, however, that the fields will probably have to get along with less than that number.

He pointed out that the FSA camp at Coburg will be expanded to take care of as many workers as arrive. Tents to house them are available, he said.
