Fresh vegetables and fried canned Philadelphia scrapple make an easy but delicious hot day dinner.

DURING August dog-days keep your kitchen as cool as possible. Wherever nutritionally valuable and good tasting canned foods fit into the budget, they may be used to cut down on preparation and cooking time.

Some hot food must be in the dinner menu. On that principle, the following dog-day menus and recipes are given, using canned foods to cut down on kitchen time.

BAKED SAUERKRAUT WITH CORNED BEEF HASH (Serves 6 to 8)

One No. 2 1/2 can sauerkraut, 1 No. 2 can corned beef hash, 1 cup canned tomato juice, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish, 1 strip bacon.

Place sauerkraut in bottom of shallow greased casserole. Mix together corned beef hash, tomato juice, onion and horseradish, and spread over sauerkraut. Cut bacon into 1/4 inch pieces and place on top of hash mixture. Bake in hot oven (340 degrees F.) for about 20 minutes.

Here's another low-cost quick hot night dinner. Fried slices of canned Philadelphia scrapple, broiled tomato halves, green peas (fresh or canned), a jellied or mixed greens salad, cup custard with fruit and cream, iced coffee, milk.

Slice the canned scrapple about 1/4 inch thick. Fry quickly in bacon drippings. Serve very hot at once.

Here's another: kidney beans, frankfurters, cole slaw with pickles, pineapple-lemon shabet or chilled pineapple tapioca cream, coffee, milk.

KIDNEY BEANS—FRANK-FURTERS (10 Servings)

Three tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 pound frankfurters, 2 No. 2 cans red kidney beans.

Brown the butter and flour together in frying pan, stirring constantly. Add 3/4 cup water, or 3/4 cup clear stock made from leftover vegetables. Remove from heat. Add beans. Pour into shallow buttered baking dish. Cut the frankfurters in half lengthwise and arrange on top of beans, pressing them lightly into the beans. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for about 30 minutes. Cut this recipe in half for small family.
