James Clubb served in the last World war in France. He was in a hospital most of the time since his return from France. He was born in Alamo, Mich., June 7, 1893. He moved with his parents to Eugene in 1911 and attended the schools here. He was a member of the Episcopal church at San Leandro, Cal., also of the American Legion post in that city.

Funeral services were held Thursday in Oakland, Cal., interment being there.

Surviving Mr. Clubb are his widow, Mrs. Grace Clubb; one son, Gordon Clubb, of San Leandro.
