The program arranged will cover all phases of specialized journalism. The faculty of the school of journalism and three outstanding students of journalism will judge the various state high school publications and awards will be given for outstanding publications.

Dean Eric W. Allen will act as toastmaster for a banquet for the journalists, Friday evening.

Examinations Open For Officer Worker

New examinations for office workers applying for jobs with the state unemployment compensation commission are announced by Professor William Griffith, supervisor for the board of examiners.

Six classifications with starting pay from \$80 to \$120 a month are listed in the announcement. The positions include junior and senior clerk-typists, junior and senior clerk-stenographers, key punch operator and junior tabulating machine operator.

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Reds Slow Down German Thrusts Toward Vyazma

vaders, however, also were reported.

The dispatches to Moscow pictured the morale of the Russians as high. All wore warm winter uniforms with long gray greatcoats and fur hats in preparedness for the winter at hand. There was little question that the greatest test of the war was impending.

Counter-Attack Fierce

The Russian counterattacks on the central front were emphasized in the concise fashion of the official Moscow communique which spoke first of continued fighting through last night of the whole front but of "particularly fierce" combat in the Vyazma area.

"In the south there was stubborn fighting against the enemy aggressor," the communique added. "At several points Soviet troops counter-attacked."

This followed by several hours a disclosure that the Russians had given up Bryansk, a key railway junction city.

The Germans spoke optimistically of a third spearhead thrust, toward Moscow from the northwest, which they said had taken the Russians by surprise and pushed them back to about 140 miles from the capital. The drive was reported still forging ahead.

Authorized sources declared today that German armored forces and motorized infantry were thrusting forward so fast that they no longer bothered to build an eastern wall around the trapped Russians but leave this task to horse-drawn artillery and foot soldiers.

11,000 Said Captured

In the south, according to Berlin, the pursuit of Russians who escaped encirclement in the battle of the Sea of Azov brought capture of 11,000 more prisoners and 33 guns while on the northwest—the Leningrad sector—"attempts of the enemy to break out were repelled with very heavy losses to the enemy."

gene as the center of the Northwest's timber industries," said Mr. Sweet. "The leaders in every line of industry travel by air and if in this building we demonstrate what can really be done with good workmanship and skillful handling it will be a project of great value to our principal industry."

The United Airlines officials were consulting the U. S. army engineers, getting accurate surveys of the site at the new airport to be set aside for administration and depot purposes. This will be a tract on the south side of the field. Under government regulations it must have 750 feet clearance from the Northwest and North-South runways and at least 250 feet clearance from the east-west taxiway along the south side.

This leaves a space about midway from the southeast corner of the field to the end of the north runway and approximately 300 by 500 feet in area, with ample space for buildings and for parking facilities.

The administration building will house the waiting room, ticket offices, baggage rooms, rest rooms for public and attendants, a heating unit, and also office space for the U. S. weather bureau and for the local offices of the Civil Aeronautics Authority. It will be

designed to permit expansion as needs require.

Preliminary drawings show a T-shaped structure on a concrete slab foundation, entirely of wood above the foundation, with very large glass view-windows in every direction.

The other wreck a Plymouth sedan driven by Glenn Thayer of 339 Jefferson, Eugene, and travelling south on Pearl was struck broadside by a Chevrolet coupe going east on Sixth. The coupe was driven by Carl H. Necrom of 615 East First, Albany. The right side of Thayer's car was smashed.

OSC Alumni Oppose Course Duplication

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 13.—(U.P.)—Oregon State College Alumni association yesterday issued a ringing denunciation of duplication of majors at the University and College, a reiteration of its former stand.

The association said: "The state board has repeatedly declared itself in support of the system to non-duplication of majors. The college alumni support the board."

"The Alumni believe that to change the fundamental basis of non-duplication of major work in one case means the beginning of the end of the system. No argument of need by state or students has been advanced; instead there has been only the argument of institutional pride."

The statement followed a Roseburg News-Review editorial claiming the board was going to settle the University "science issue" this month.
