known in a last-minute letter to Speaker Sam Rayburn and Democratic John W. McCormack, D. Mass.

The letter was in reply to a request by the house leaders to make his position clearly understood as the house was about to cast a momentous vote on the neutrality revision program.

Would Aid Axis
Referring to the senate legislation to repeal section 2 and 3 of the neutrality act and thus permit American merchant ships to go to belligerent ports, the president said:

"Failure to repeal these sections would of course cause rejoicing in the axis nations. Failure would bolster aggressive stances and intentions in Germany and in other well-known aggressor nations under the leadership of Hitler.

Strike Issue Involved

"Such failure would weaken our great effort to produce all we possibly can and as rapidly as we can. Strikes and stoppages of work would become less serious in the mind of the public."

Mr. Roosevelt observed that the house was acting on the eve of crucial negotiations with the United Mine Workers and the steel companies over the issue of continuing production in the captive mines.

A few minutes after the president's letter arrived at the capitol, McCormack announced that he had received a similar appeal from Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

Metropolitan Store Goes 100%

The Metropolitan Cash store was the first business firm to go 100 per cent in the annual Lane county Red Cross roll call, Hale G. Thompson, drive chairman, announced Thursday. Every employee of the store joined and the firm also contributed to the organization.

A group of 40 women met Wednesday morning at Red Cross headquarters to receive final instructions before beginning their house-to-house membership canvass. Although first figures are not yet available, the workers report that they are receiving a much better response than last year. The women hope to complete their work by Wednesday, Nov. 19.

Work of the Lane county Red Cross chapter like those throughout the country has assumed a "full speed ahead" character during the past six months or a year and persons needing assistance or advice will find the headquarters at 33 Eighth avenue west open all day and far into the night.

Some of the accomplishments and features of the program carried on locally are brought to light in a report prepared for the roll call drive:

(1) Disaster relief—The Lane county committee under the leadership of F. Ford Northrup, functioned when homes of a dozen families were destroyed in the Marcola milltown fire. Immediate assistance was given those unable to care for themselves and a rehabilitation program was carried on with seven families enabling them to buy furniture, household equipment, clothing, etc.

(2) First aid—During the past ten months approximately 2000 citizens of Lane county have received certificates in first aid training. At the present time volunteer instructors are conducting 35 classes in the county. The Oregon Women's Ambulance corps is being taught first aid by three volunteer instructors and must receive their Red Cross certificates before completing their course in ambulance training.

(3) Water safety—Ten day swimming programs were taught in 16 communities in the county during the past summer. Over 2100 children and adults were taught how to swim or how to swim better. Some communities arrange to retain their instructors and conduct a 20 or 30 day program. This is done each year in Wendling where the program

is sponsored by the Community club.

(4) Home nursing—Six home nursing classes are in progress at the present time and are being conducted in the chapter offices where eight hospital beds and other sick room equipment has been furnished. Wendling, Florence and Blue River are planning to start classes after the first of the year and Mrs. Neil Hennessy, chairman, plans to have approximately 500 women trained in home nursing during the next year. Certificates are awarded after 24 hours of lecture and practical work.

(5) Production—The program includes both sewing and surgical dressings. Over 1000 Lane county women are participating in this work and are producing 23,000 dressings every six weeks. Headquarters are maintained in both Eugene and Cottage Grove. Mrs. Merle Chase and Mrs. G. E. Lehman who are in charge of the sewing for war relief and for the soldiers and sailors hospitals announced recently that they are completing the 8000 yard quota set for the past six months. Branches at Junction City and Florence are also assisting with this sewing.

(6) Accident prevention—Eight classes were conducted by volunteer instructors during the past year. These classes approach the problem on an educational basis. "Check lists" tabulating accident hazards in the home and on the farm were distributed through the Lane county schools under the leadership of R. C. Kuehner.

Gun Accident Kills Youth

CRESWELL, Nov. 13. — (Special) — Leslie Cameron, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard C. Cameron of Upper Camas Swale, was found dead Thursday morning in the underbrush about one-fourth mile from his home from gun shot wounds.

The youth went out alone hunting Wednesday afternoon about 1 o'clock and when he did not return a searching party was organized. No trace was found until Thursday morning when his father discovered the body. Apparently the loaded .22 which he carried had become caught in the underbrush and discharged, killing him instantly, according to Harold Poole, deputy coroner.

Gile Holderman, state police officer, also investigated the case. The body has been taken to the Schwering chapel in Creswell and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Alvadore Man, 72, Dies At Home
