Tuberculin Tests Given—

Tuberculin testing surveys have been concluded during the past month in the schools of Eugene, Cottage Grove, Marcola, Triangle Lake and Florence. In Eugene 1114 persons were tested with 47 positive reactors. Cottage Grove had 371 taking the test with 23 showing a positive reaction. Marcola had 60 taking the test with one positive reactor.

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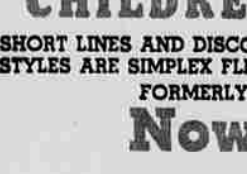
