Unemployment Fund Reserves Pile Up

During 1941, the state unemployment compensation commission collected 27 per cent more than in 1940 and paid out 39 per cent less, resulting in a trust fund of \$16,378,561 at the year's end, which came to \$6,322,229 more than at the close of the previous year, recent figures reveal. Benefits paid out dropped to \$2,485,554. In 1938, these payments amounted to \$5,916,399. In 1939 they were \$4,052,888, while they were \$4,089,925 in 1940. Collections which included employers' contributions mainly on 1940 and 1941 payrolls and interest paid by the federal government on the state trust fund, increased from \$8,925,753 to \$8,797,856.
