

Germans Claim Victory On Kerch Battle Front

a far cry from the smashing offensives launched by the Germans at this season in western Europe in 1940 and in the Balkans in 1941.

The Russians conceded however that it was the strongest attack the Germans have made so far this spring.

In a special communique, the German high command declared: "The battle to break through on the isthmus of Kerch has been decided. It concluded with the annihilation of enemy forces which have been overrun and encircled there."

Pursuit of the beaten remainder of the enemy is being continued in the direction of Kerch. The Nazi communique said that in addition to the 40,000 Soviet prisoners—nearly three divisions—the Russians had lost 197 tanks, 598 guns, 286 warplanes and "countless other war material."

DNB, the German news agency, asserted that Nazi troops were thrusting "far beyond the Paratch positions," on the neck of the Kerch peninsula, and declared: "Resistance of the first Soviet defense line has been broken by artillery fire. Infantry is being thrown into the attack."

Latest Moscow dispatches said only that powerful axis and Soviet armies fought on across the narrow Crimean peninsula, with the Germans throwing masses of cavalry, tanks, planes and troops against the Russian defenders.

"During May 12 on the Kerch peninsula, several battles took place with the enemy," a Soviet communique said.

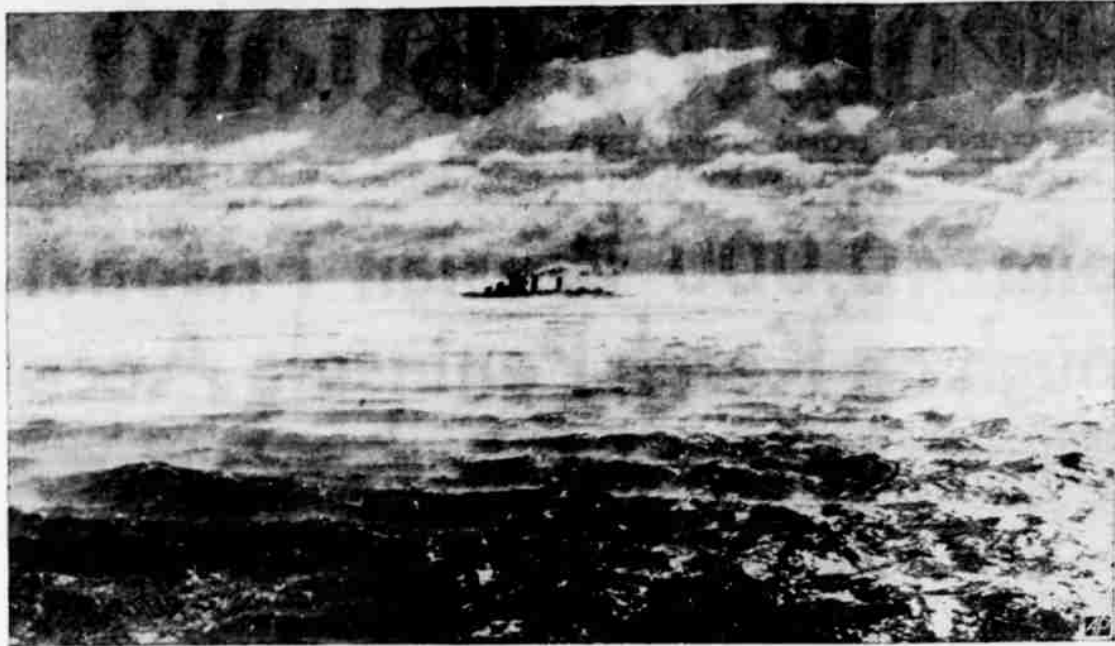
Cascara Peelers Are Given Warning

Cascara bark peelers, who are striking it rich in Lane county this year on the tide of a 15-cent-per-pound price, were warned by I. P. Callison & Sons in Chehalis, Wash., Wednesday, that conservation must be practiced in order to avoid damage to the crop. Trees should be cut down when they are peeled, the company warned. Next spring the stump will throw out new saplings and produce a heavy growth in a very few years if the trees are cut down. If the tree is left standing after peeling, the roots will die.

250 Loggers Will Attend Meet Here

More than 250 Oregon loggers from every county west of the Cascades will converge on Eugene Friday and Saturday to learn how to keep trucks running with out tires and repair parts, and how to keep up maximum production of logs without maintenance parts for tractors and heavy machinery.

According to Jack Lewis, president of the Willamette Valley Logging Conference, the fourth annual session will be one of the most important in the history of the industry in Oregon. "We are faced with a mighty tough assignment," Lewis said.

"We are being asked to keep those logs rolling to the sawmills, and in the next breath are told that we can't have sufficient truck tires, trucks, or machinery parts to keep our normal equipment running. Our condition is serious, and we are willing to learn just how this can be done, so we have asked experts from the truck and tractor firms to give us all the information they have on maintenance and repair of equipment."

Reservations received so far in-

dicating a record turnout, according to H. J. Cox, secretary-manager of the conference. Women of the conference will be entertained at a special banquet by the machinery firms.

The program will be featured by prominent men in the industry. Otto Hartwig, of the Crown Willamette, will talk on "Safety First in the Industry"; Edmund Hayes and Walker B. Tiller, will discuss "Tree Farms," one of the most important problems now under consideration by the logging industry; Nels Rogers state forester and Warren Tilton, industry forester, will talk on "Fire Protection," number one worry of the entire state this war year.

Few Stations Have Sand, Survey Shows

Only a few of Eugene's service stations have stocked sand for use in putting out incendiary bombs, a survey indicated Wednesday.

At the suggestion of Mahlon Sweet, the city council and defense organizations agreed in the month of March to make service stations throughout the city the distribution centers for the sand. Several of the stations immediately stocked the sand, but the great majority of the stations received no orders, and did nothing about the problem.

Defense officials pointed out Wednesday that sand may be obtained from the city's sand and gravel companies as well as from a few of the service stations.

According to the instructions issued by the Oregon state defense council, the sand should be used in the following manner:

Have three sacks of thoroughly dry sand; also a pail with three or four inches of dry sand across the bottom. Cautiously open the door where the bomb is, leaving a pail with sand on the bottom in the doorway. Crawl up to the bomb on your hands and knees, holding a sack of sand in front of your face, with the elbow of that arm on the floor to support it (this protects you in case of explosion). Drop the sack of sand directly on top of the bomb (using the dry method you get the bomb first and the surrounding fire after). Try to approach the bomb from the side on which there is no surrounding fire. The flames will burn through the sack and release the sand on the bomb, reducing the fire.

Hurry back to the pail of sand in the doorway and carry it near the bomb. Then pick up the bomb (sand and all) with a long handled shovel and drop it in the pail. Shovel up loose sand remaining

and drop it on top of the bomb in the pail. Carry the pail on the shovel and take it outside and pile dirt on top. Go back to the room and, using remaining sand or reserve water supply, put out the flames left behind.

George Root Receives Contract For Scenario Writing With Studio

PORTLAND, May 13.—(AP)—Geo. G. Root Jr., former educational activities manager at the University of Oregon, has been awarded a scholarship at a Hollywood film studio.

Root won the scholarship and a contract with a six-month option with Twentieth Century-Fox in a scenario writing contest at the Columbia University graduate journalism school, where he has just completed study.

He was twice editor of the student yearbook, the Oregana, while at Oregon. He took a leave of absence last year.
