Both committees passed motions empowering the officers or executive group to fill such vacancies as occur in the precincts.

Talk Given
At the republican meeting, Huntington told the group a real job was ahead and not to regard any candidate as a cinch to be elected. He urged greater effort on the part of precinct committeemen and committeewomen during the campaign. James A. Rodman, Earl Hill, Dr. M. C. Harris, and F. G. Stickels, the latter two both past county chairmen, all gave pep talks.

At the democratic meeting, a resolution was passed supporting all democratic candidates in the coming election and urging democrats to get out and vote for their party candidates. In the county election, the democrats now have a full ticket, several write-in candidates having accepted the nomination, including Judd Stauffer, who is running for county treasurer; Ethan L. Newman, who is running for state senator from Lane county; and Mrs. Hester Reed, who is running for state representative from Lane county. Ray A. McInnis being the other democrat for representative. Talks at the Saturday meeting were given by Edward C. Kelly, democratic candidate for the new fourth congressional district; Fred Fisk, and others.

Germans Advance In Kharkov Fighting

MOSCOW, Sunday, June 21—(AP)—The Germans continued last night to batter Sevastopol with some 150,000 men and hundreds of planes and tanks and at the same time registered a new advance in a revival of fighting on the Kharkov front, the Russians announced early today.

"Our heroic defenders are repulsing the enemy attacks day and night," the midnight communique said of the battle for Sevastopol, which has reached a peak of violence with the Germans making a mighty effort to break into the Black sea naval base.

With the Nazis recklessly charging the north and south sides of the fortress, the soviet communique reported one defending battery wiped out an entire enemy infantry battalion.

Boy Scouts' Camp Will Open July 5

The annual encampment of Lane county Boy Scouts at Camp Lucky Boy in the Blue River district will open this year July 5, it was announced by local scout leaders Saturday.

The first period will extend from July 5 through July 18, and the second will be from July 19 through July 26.

Hiking will be one of the principal features of this year's camp program. Trips are scheduled to Carpenter mountain, Tid-Bits, Elephant Rock, Texas lake, Huckleberry mountain, Lava Lake, the Middle Sister, Scott lake and many other short hikes up and down Blue river.

Scouts are being urged to register now, at the Boy Scout office in the First National bank building, for the summer trips.

Scouts will be asked to equip themselves with blankets or sleeping bag, hiking boots or shoes, tennis shoes, underwear, socks, handkerchiefs, pajamas, overalls or slacks, scout uniform, towels, bathing suit, toilet articles sewing kits for mending, scout handbook, flashlight and any other equipment, including first aid kit or camera.
