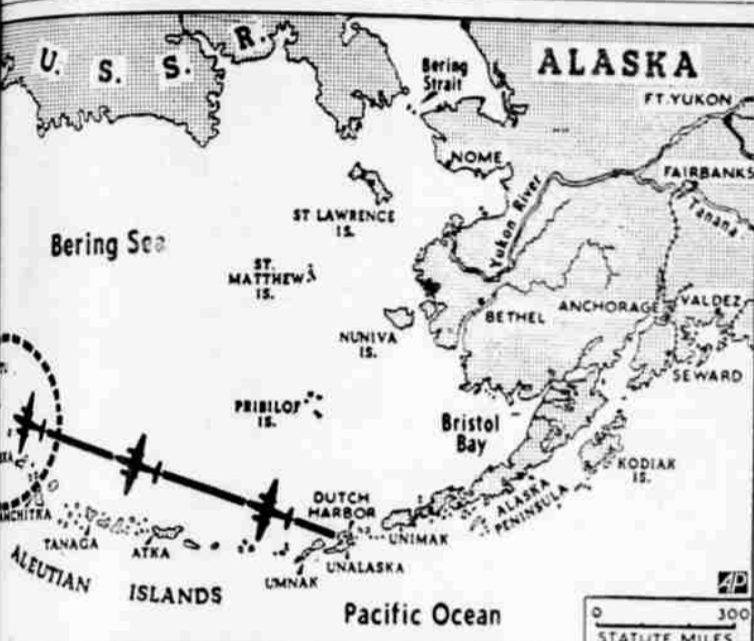

Five Pools Closed By EFG Board

Closing of five pools on last year's produce is announced by the board of directors of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association as follows: Cabbage, closed at \$26 a ton on No. 1; \$18 a ton on No. 2; crabapples, closed at \$68 a ton; corn, closed at \$26.50 per ton No. 1; \$17.50 per ton on No. 2; pears, closed at \$63 a ton on No. 1 and \$53 a ton on No. 2; spinach, \$30 a ton. The board expressed its satisfaction at the prices listed.

The cannery of the EFG finished up on spinach this week. The pack was exceptionally fine, reports E. A. McCormack, manager. Strawberries will be coming in this week. Cherries are unusually late this year, the main crop not to be coming in until the first of the month. Usually, cherries are all through by the first of July. The market situation on both strawberries and cherries, looking gloomy for a time because of war restrictions, is considerably better, McCormack states.
