Civil Service Seeks Airport Controllers

District officers of the U. S. civil service commission through-out the country Monday began to recruit airway and airport traffic controllers at the trainee grade, paying \$1,800 per year, according to word received by Frank L. Armitage, postmaster.
Citizens, 20 to 35 years, with general experience in the field of air traffic control, may apply. If they possess a current pilot's certificate showing that they are physically qualified for commercial pilot rating. Applications may be filed until further notice at district offices in Seattle and San Francisco. Applications for higher grades of air-traffic controller will no longer be accepted.
