Two Cottage Grove Airplane Observers Have Served More Than 200 Hours Since War

COTTAGE GROVE—Three persons are still taking their regular watch at the post, who were on duty during the test practices held in October 1941, and have consistently taken their watch since the observation post was established immediately following the attack on Pearl Harbor. Miss Sybil Veatch is chief observer of the Cottage Grove post and Clarence Long is assistant chief observer. Miss Veatch was on the first shift after Pearl Harbor and reported the first airplane observed. Two others, namely, Mrs. Frank McCullough and Mrs. Brighton Leonard were also on duty during the tests and on regular shifts since the war. Others who have taken regular shifts and been on duty consistently since December 8 and are still on duty, include George Foster, Vernon Booher, E. L. Wade, Mrs. Jeff Turner, Victor Carlson, Frank Thompson, Mrs. Socco Serima, Mrs. Harry Tenny, Mrs. Harley Gates, and Mrs. Glenn Flatters. L. D. Tucker and Miss Sybil Veatch have each served 231 hours. J. L. Plaster has served 174 hours and Clarence Long 135 hours. None of these have ever had a substitute for their shift. Mr. Tucker, Mr. Plaster and Mrs. Long received their arm bands in recognition of 100 hours service before May 17. Mrs. Winifred Mosby works on both the Cottage Grove post and the Mosby Creek post. Back at Hillside, part of today was spent in poling some late string beans. Finding hens' teeth is child's play compared to finding bean poles. Telling Angus to play like he was a blood hound, he and I hunted poles. Not finding any, we substituted. Some of the substitutes were—a strip of grooved molding intended for use in a window casing; the clothesline prop; a radio aerial pole made three more; a log scaling stick the man will retrieve if he discovers it before the vines hide its identity; a fishing rod; some pieces of seasoned ash out of which my lord had expected to make bows for his archery project. As I look at the assorted poles, I don't know whether they make the patch look rakishly debonair or in a state of insanity.

As I poled the beans, I pulled lambs quarter for the two little white pigs. It is a time-honored custom with us, to call the current pig Susie. Two pigs presented a problem in christening which we seemed unable to meet. So far, they are simply referred to as The Susies. Their little corkscrew tails vibrated joyously

as I fed them the fresh lambs quarter. Clean as kittens, their skin glows pinkly through their white bristles. They have long white eyelashes and mezzo-soprano voices; mezzo when contented, soprano when excited.

They are the politest pigs I've ever known, and tonight I was all for bringing one of the infants into the house as a source of entertainment. But with only one ancestor from Ireland, we felt we did not rate a pig in the parlor.

Tonight my hands are rough and stained, past bleaching; my back aches and my shoes are full of dirt; and I haven't been so happy since the last time my hands were rough and my back ached. Could it be that I simply don't have it in me to be a lady? I must take time off, some day, and think it over.
