

Anderson Says Food Prices Will Increase

Controls Needed To Prevent Possible 30 Cent Rise

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Administrator Leon Henderson today applied new pressure on farm prices by warning of uncontrolled food price rise at the current rate. Henderson said consumers will be paying 20 per cent more for foodstuffs a year from now.

The effect of increases of this nature on the average family would be most destructive, Henderson said. "Inflation would have a foot in the kitchen even if continued in holding the line as it has set for the things it has empowered to control."

Prices Rise
Statistics released by the department of labor today show that prices of uncontrolled foodstuffs have risen 10 per cent since June 15. The same items advanced 4.8 per cent in the previous month.

Statement was regarded as a public support in his fight against the congressional bloc and farm organizations. Henderson said in a speech Wednesday that the time had come when the 110 per cent price control should be repealed in favor of 100 per cent parity.

Lumber Workers Deemed Essential To War, Will Be Deferred Say Officials

Men employed in the logging and lumber industry have the same rights for deferment from the draft as workers in the shipyards, airplane plants and other war industries, because logging and mill work are considered essential to the war effort, L. C. Stoll, state director of the U. S. employment service, told a group of 60 Willamette Valley lumber operators Friday morning in a meeting at the Osburn hotel.

More Changes In WPB Urged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Blaming "certain dollar-a-year men" of the war production board for shortages of critical war material, CIO members of WPB's labor advisory committee called upon chairman Donald M. Nelson today for their dismissal.

As WPB officials disclosed that Nelson had directed a review of personnel and elimination of executives considered unsuited to their jobs, the advisory committee's three CIO members made public a resolution protesting that the war effort was "being paralyzed" as a result of inefficient planning.

The petition was signed by Clinton Golden, assistant to the president of the United Steel Workers of America; John Green, president of the CIO international union of marine and shipbuilding workers of America; and Walter Reuther, vice-president of the United Automobile and Aircraft Workers of America.

Slav Patriots Wreck Express Train, Kill 21

LONDON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—A fresh wave of sabotage by Yugoslav patriots was climaxed Saturday by wrecking the Zagreb-Belgrade express train, with 21 persons killed and 32 injured, Yugoslav sources reported today.

The German field commandant at Nis, named Von Bothmer, offered rewards for arrests of persons who recently cut the Belgrade-Salonika railroad at three points, they said.

The report added that Serbian villages near the scene had been "severely punished" and two Bulgarian regiments were coming to the area north of Nis in search of Chetnik forces.

Call Of 3-A Men May Come In November

EVANSTON, Ill., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director, said today that "on the basis of present factors" draft boards "might" begin calling men with dependent wives in November.

Hershey made the statement while elaborating on a speech he had made earlier.

Nazi Crossing Of Don Smashed

MOSCOW, Friday, Aug. 21.—(AP)—German forces have stormed across the Don northwest of Stalingrad for the second time within 24 hours, the Soviet high command announced today, and Russian defenders of the east bank, after wiping out the first hand, "almost completely destroyed" the second.

As the battle of the Don-Caucasus flared to new intensity, the Germans were reported attacking heavily on both wings of the pincers drive against Stalingrad, and admitted scored new gains south of Krasnodar above the Novorossisk naval base and southeast of Pyatigorsk on the road to the Grozny oil fields.

The midnight communique of the high command reported fierce and bloody battles along the Don southeast of Kletskaia, where "considerable forces" of Germans strove to smash across toward Stalingrad. Equally savage struggles raged northeast of Kotelnikovsky, it said, and at one point the Germans were thrown back after wedging into the Soviet positions.

Twelve hours earlier the high command had announced the first German crossing of the Don loop northwest of Stalingrad, and said the force was "annihilated." Revealing the second crossing, it said Soviet tanks and infantry "almost completely destroyed" the group. It was unclear whether the Germans retained a toehold on the east bank of the river a scant 40 to 50 miles from Stalingrad.

Chinese Recapture Kwangfeng From Japs

CHUNGKING, Aug. 21.—(AP)—An official Chinese military report today said Chinese forces had recaptured Kwangfeng, which the Japanese had developed into one of their most powerful strongholds in Kiangsi province.

It was stated the recapture had dispelled the threat of the first overland Japanese invasion of Fukien province.

Use Of Parachute Troops, Dive Bombers Would Have Made Raid More Successful

LONDON, Aug. 21.—(UP)—A detailed study of the Dieppe raid in preparation for more big-scale attacks on the continent convinced many observers today that the Commandos would have achieved a smashing victory instead of a moderate success if they had employed dive bombers and parachutists.

Although the nine-hour attack constituted the hardest-hitting, most highly integrated land, sea and air operation ever attempted by the British, an analysis of the raid revealed that its success was limited, particularly because of allied losses.

Observers also pointed out that parachutists dropped around German artillery batteries back from the beach could have taken the gun crews by surprise and could have seized control of bridges and junctions, preventing the enemy from rushing up reinforcements to the beach.

Despite the deficiencies, however, all observers described the Dieppe raid as a worthwhile contribution to preparations for the ultimate offensive that will carry the war back to the continent.

VICHY SAYS 3,500 ALLIES KILLED AT DIEPPE
VICHY, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Fernand De Brinon, Vichy representative in Paris, told a French cabinet meeting today that the Allies lost 3,500 men killed and 1,800 captured at Dieppe Wednesday.

The majority were Canadians, with a few De Gaulle French, De Brinon said. He came here to give the German report on the coastal raid.

No Word On Attack Given By U. S. Navy

Engagement Might Be 'Commando Thrust,' Observers Believe

The Japanese navy reported today a landing attack by United States forces on Makin island in the Gilberts, 2,400 miles from Hawaii, and the wording of the communique aroused speculation that the action had been a task force raid in strength.

Imperial Japanese headquarters said the landing was made by about 200 troops four days ago and that they were "completely repelled" by the Japanese garrison. This, however, was the usual Japanese formula for beating the opponent to announcement of a Japanese reverse.

Meanwhile a British radio report said American Flying Fortresses had made a large-scale attack on Japanese warships off the Solomon islands. However, this report had received no elaboration after several hours and it appeared likely it was merely a restatement of General MacArthur's communique of Thursday, announcing such an attack on enemy naval units off Faisi, at the northern tip of the Solomons.

Inspectors To See Truck Body Model
