Grandmother's Advice Not Popular

After writing the column in which the tendency of young mothers to send their children home to grandmother to raise was deplored, I felt a few pangs of apprehension, lest I'd gone a step too far. Yet if reader response is any measure, I need have no worry along that score, for there have been many of these.

Most of them from grandmothers, they tell me I wasn't half strong enough. Each letter emphasizes the fact that the writer loves her daughter, and adores her grandchildren. It's just that, having brought one set of youngsters through to maturity, none of them seems to effervesce with enthusiasm at tackling the job all over again.

Some come right out and say they're too old and tired to do a task even younger women admit wears them out. Others say they're equal to it, but are also equal to holding a job which would pay more, and have the added fillup of being a new adventure. One and all, they wound up by asking me not to quote them. "I feel like a heel," one grandmother wrote, "talking to even you this way." Another thanked me for what she called "championing grandmothers."

But as is always the case, there were on-the-other-hand letters, too. One such letter said in part, "How about grandmothers who are always dishing out advice to their daughters on how to raise the grandchildren? If grandmothers would only learn to respect, some of the new-fangled ideas, such as feeding baby on schedule; gradually introducing new foods to him, instead of suddenly letting him eat all the potatoes and gravy he wants at one sitting. Don't misunderstand me; I like to get some advice, but do not like having it shoved at me all the time."

Well, there you are, Grandmothers, with a problem of your own, put right back in your laps. I'm not a grandmother yet. I'm going to save this letter, and read it again when I am.
