CHICKEN CROQUETTES (Makes 8) Three tablespoons quick tapioca, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 2 tablespoons minced green pepper, 2 tablespoons minced pimiento, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup chicken stock, 1/2 cup chopped cooked chicken, sifted bread or cracker crumbs, 1 egg beaten with 3 tablespoons milk and dash of salt.
