

3 Scouts Win Eagle Award

The boy scout court of honor Friday night at the Woodrow Wilson Junior high school proved to be the high spot of the scouting career for Bill Moore, Pat Byrne, Troop 54, and Ted LaCourse, Troop 34, Morristown, N. J., all of whom received the coveted eagle scout badge, the highest award granted by the Boy Scouts of America.

In the presence of over two hundred spectators the three were called to the stage by Dr. E. D. Furrer, judge of the court of honor. Lloyd Payne, president of the Wallamet council, made the awards. The fathers and mothers of Moore and Byrne acted as their sponsors, and K. A. Wells, local scout executive acted as the sponsor for Ted LaCourse.

Ronald Byers of troop 77 received the gold eagle scout palm from the scout executive who commented upon the rarity of this particular badge. G. E. Gaylor, sea scout commodore, presented an able sea scout award to Bob Naper of the Sea Scout Ship Enterprise. The life scout award went to Bill Johnston of troop 54 and the award was made by Lee Murphy, district commissioner. Numerous special awards for civic service and perfect attendance were made as well as awards for second class, first class, and merit badge ranks.

Tuberculin Test Given to 363

The Lane County Public Health department administered 363 tuberculin tests to students at Eugene high school Thursday and Friday, Dr. C. R. Lindgren, county health officer reported.

"This was nearly a 100 percent response," Dr. Lindgren said, explaining that taking the test was a voluntary matter. The health department will give tests at University high school early next week. Lindgren said that as many cases of tuberculosis were reported in Oregon during the first eight months as 1942 as were disclosed during all of last year.

"This distinct increase is especially notable in the older age groups," he continued. "The disease shows a decrease in the younger age groups, but an increase in one forebodes increase in the other also. For this reason these check up tests given in the schools are very important."

He added that in anti-tuberculosis work, the local health department is aided by the tuberculosis association, in Lane county called the Lane County public health association. The Christmas Seal sale is the sole support of the work of the tuberculosis associations, he concluded.

Former Grove Man Dies in Pennsylvania

Word has been received of the death of H. L. Grube, a former Cottage Grove resident, December 11, in Punsautawney, Pa. Mr. Grube was born in Pennsylvania on April 4, 1861. During the morning and afternoon, Mr. English will be available for appointments with those who want their priorities questions answered. The chamber of commerce is making the appointments.

"The controlled materials plan is a natural outgrowth of previous priorities plans and ultimately will supplant all other priorities methods," it is pointed out by J. Fred Bergesch, Oregon district manager of the WPB. "It is designed to allocate the amount of materials needed by all industry in so far as the supply will permit and to eliminate such situations in which

Meals at Jail Cost 27 Cents Each

Sixty-one prisoners in the county jail in November were given 1093 meals at an average cost of 27 cents a meal, it is revealed in the monthly report of activities of the sheriff's office made public Saturday. The total sustenance cost at the jail was \$284.21, Sheriff Crowe reports.

The report shows that the total number of cases handled during the month was 154. Of these, 86 were civil, 38 criminal and 30 miscellaneous.

In serving civil processes the sheriff and his deputies traveled 700 miles; on criminal work, 1038 miles, and miscellaneous cases, 652 miles, a total of 2390 miles.

Hours spent in civil processes were 88; criminal, 101; miscellaneous, 742, and at the jail, 642, a total of 1573.

Fourteen arrests were made by the sheriff and his deputies during the month.
