Mr. Crawford is well known because of his broadcasts over KORE and 206 other stations across the country every Sunday afternoon. On this trip to the Pacific coast he will be accompanied by Mrs. Crawford who arranges the musical program and by the Young People's Church of the Air male quartet. Dr. Vance H. Webster, the pastor of the local church, will preside and Rev. G. L. Roush of the Church of God will offer the evening prayer.

Mr. Crawford is the founder of King's College at New Castle, Del., and is the manager of Pinebrook, one of the largest young people's camps in the world.

Seven years ago he and Mrs. Crawford started broadcasting over one station and have steadily increased the number until the present coast to coast hook-up of 207.

The Crawfords are appearing at Portland and Eugene in Oregon and then proceeding to Chico and Los Angeles, Calif.

EDITORIAL

AWARENESS OF GOD

Show me your God! the doubter cries
I point him to the smiling skies
I show him all the woodland greens
I show him peaceful Sylvan scenes
I show him winter snows and frost
I show him waters tempest tossed
I show him hills, rock-ribbed and strong
I bid him hear the thrush's song
I show him rivers, babbling streams
I show him youthful hopes and dreams
I show him maids with eager hearts
I show him toilers in the marts
I show him stars—the moon, the sun
I show him deeds of kindness done

I show him joy, I show him care
And still he holds his doubting air
And faithless goes his way, for he
Is blind of soul, and cannot see!

How grateful we are to people like Marjorie Rawlings, and David Grayson, and Olive Barber, for their ability to show the truly wonderful nature of plain ordinary aspects of life. Cross Creek is a wild tangle of forest everglade, with mosquitos and copperheads and shy, illiterate natives. But when Marjorie Rawlings tells about it, it becomes attractive and beautiful. Go for a walk through the woods with David Grayson, and it is a very real adventure in contentment. For he can see so many interesting details to comment on—point out so many fascinating facts, that a walk becomes a dip into a living encyclopedia.

These folks have awareness. They are aware of truths that most of us are blind to. How is this awareness cultivated? Miriam Teichner has written a poem that expresses something we all feel:

God—let me be aware
Let me not stumble blindly down the ways
Just getting somehow through the days
Not even groping for another hand
Not even wondering why it all was planned
Eyes to the ground, unseeing for the light
Soul never aching for a wild-winged flight
Please, keep me eager just to do my share
God—let me be aware.

It was a little over a year ago, that our family became enthused over a series of children's books by Laura Wilder, which we found in the Eugene Public Library. Laura Ingalls Wilder is an old lady now, but when she was a little girl she lived on the frontier. Her father was one of these men with "movitis" in their blood.

As the frontier gradually spread westward, with Wisconsin, Oklahoma and the Dakotas opening for settlement, Mr. Ingalls would move his family, always looking for a better location. The result was, that this one family went through a whole gamut of frontier privation. Everything that could happen, seemingly, happened to them.

When you read about the hardships that they endured, you are amazed, especially it is amazing that a person who went through those raw frontier privations is still alive to tell about it. And how she can tell about it.

Even though a little girl, Laura Ingalls absorbed the whole rough and rugged drama. In other words, she was not "stumbling blindly down the ways, just getting somehow through the days." She was aware! If you will read those books of hers, you will know how thoroughly she was aware. And while she apparently writes for children, to tell them of the experiences children had in the pioneer days, these books are the kind you can't lay down yourself, even when you've read the children into slumberland. And one of the questions you ask yourself is this, "How does it happen, that this little old lady, who didn't start writing until she was in her 70's—how did she ever see so much and feel so much that she can describe every detail, even today?

The answer is, that Laura had a sister, a year or so older, who was blind. And early in her career her mother said to her, "Laura, you are going to have to be Mary's eyes." And she was. Laura was Mary's eyes. Whenever Laura looked at anything, she was not just looking at it for herself. She had to look at it for Mary. She had to examine it closely, so that she could describe it accurately. In other words, she had to photograph it on her mind, so that she could re-create it in words, for Mary.

No wonder she could re-create it for us today. Laura has that capacity of awareness. And she got it . . . let us note, by doing a deed of kindness for someone else. She got awareness, not through what she did for herself, but through what she did for another. This analogy, I believe, is just as valid in its religious insight. Awareness of God comes, for most of us at least, not through the activities we carry on which are self-centered, but through the giving of ourselves and our substance, for others. Examples of this are so numerous that we hardly need point them out.

Let me simply say this: The persons we all revere as godlike, the persons we all agree make us aware of the divine goodness, are those whose actions are selfless. Whose first consideration is not for themselves, but for their fellow men. I recently saw a cartoon in two parts. The first part showed a successful surgeon, seated in his luxurious office, saying to an elegantly dressed woman: "My fee for that will be \$5000." The second part showed that same surgeon in an army hospital tent, just behind the lines. He is working over a soldier patient, and you can see a long line of wounded waiting for his attention.

A nurse is saying, "but doctor, you've been operating 16 hours, shouldn't you have a rest?" There is no reply from the doctor, but the artist has drawn a halo about his head.

Yes, we become aware of God—his spirit actively manifests itself in the midst of our daily round, in the unselfishness of human service—in "service above self."
