Pupils Who Buy Bonds May Receive Souvenirs

Lane county school pupils who buy war bonds are eligible to receive a souvenir from the old battleship Oregon which is soon to be dismantled and the metal used for war purposes.

The pupils are required to give their teachers their names and the dates of purchase of the bonds and the serial numbers of the bonds, and the teachers will arrange for the delivery of the souvenirs.

Those who have bought bonds since December 1, 1943, or will have bought them up to January 30, 1943 are eligible.

Springfield Postage Sales Gain 19.4

SPRINGFIELD — The postage stamp sales at the Springfield post office showed a gain of 19.4 per cent for the quarter ending December 31, 1942 over the same period in 1941. Money received during the latter period totaled \$8,710.08 compared to \$7,293.60 for the last quarter in 1941. The total intake in stamp sales for the year of 1942 was \$24,939.45 compared to \$20,679.68 in 1941, a gain of 20.5 per cent last year.
