Exploration Movie To Be Shown Friday

Glimpses of six widely scattered points of the globe will be shown the public Friday, January 8, when the motion picture "Explorers of the World" will be presented in Room 207 Chapman hall by the University of Oregon museum of natural history. The film will be given at 7:15 p. m. and a small admission fee will be charged.

The following world-famous expeditions will be featured in the film: Harold McCracken's expedition to the Siberian Arctic, James L. Clark's African expedition, the Byrd Antarctic expedition (Laurence M. Gould, geologist, as lecturer), Gene Lamb's photo-scientific expedition to Tibet, Lieut. Com. J. R. Stenhouse's Imperial Trans-Arctic expedition, and Harold Noice's expedition to northwestern Brazil.

Dr. Luther S. Cressman, director of the museum, announced that later in the school year the museum hopes to show films portraying parts of the world where American soldiers are stationed.

FAN FARE

THE FALCON'S BROTHER BELLS OF CAPISTRANO

Laraine Day for several years played nurse and sweetheart to Lew Ayres in the Dr. Kildare pictures. Then, in 1941, she was named motion picture exhibitor's Star of Tomorrow No. 1, and M-G-M realized she deserved better roles. To remove her logically from the series, the company instructed its scriptists to have Nurse Mary "killed." They chose a George Sanders, who plays his last performance as Gay "Falcon" Lawrence, comes to a more heroic end in "The Falcon's Brother." Here, too, the death is arranged purely intentionally by Stuart Palmer and Craig Rice, scenarists.

George was becoming bored with the role, wanted more varied parts, and was tired playing amateur detective. He delights in seeing ladies and gentlemen squirm, would much rather be villain in roles that demand particular characterization than to continue in a part of established character.

For this reason, the versatile Mr. Sanders is bowing out of the role patterned for movie purposes (and entirely coincidentally) on "The Saint" "Robin Hood" of the underworld created by Leslie Charteris and whom Sanders portrayed in his film series immediately preceding the Falcon one on the RKO schedule. (Character of The Falcon was created by Michael Arlen.)

Taking over the series is Tom Conway, Sanders' real-life brother, as the Falcon's brother. In the part he is dashing, pleasantly wolfish, suavely voiced and mannered. In his attitude toward women, he combines slight menace with smoothness, rather than disdain congaugled with oiliness like a good bet for RKO and for the movie-detective-fan public, not to mention the ladies, whether they ripple ecstatically over George—or not.

Our simple wonder is how future films in the series will be titled. Will he be known simply as "The Falcon's Brother"? Pity the poor marquee-letterman who has to cram in such titles, possibly, as "The Falcon's Brother Returns," "The Falcon's Brother Strikes at Dusk," "The Falcon's Brother's Last Fling."

Also worth noting is Jane Randolph, neatly turned out ingenue, playing a reporter who exhibits new dresses oftener than Henry J. Kaiser turns out ships. For the most part only a prop to the plot, she adds more than the usual amount of refreshing prettiness, and gets exactly one (1) kiss from the Falcon's brother.

The cowboy film is Gene Autry's last before joining the army air force. It comes near the top of his musical films in entertainment value, features his stanch stand-by Smiley Burnette and Joe Strauch, Jr., and Virginia Grey as the gal. Such songs as "Don't Bite the Hand That's Feeding You," "At Sundown," and "In Old Capistrano" are interspersed with rodeo high jinks.
