LOWELL—Lowell for a time was cut off from the outside world by high waters. A small bridge next to Lowell bridge was taken out by a second rise in the water, leaving a fifty-foot gap in the road. A fill on Fall Creek road went out leaving that road closed. Several people were evacuated from the lowlands. Most of the houses had two to five inches of water covering floors and depositing large quantities of mud. Other bridges were damaged. Most of the poultry farms felt a shortage of feed.

Lowell schools will open again Monday, Jan. 11. Several bridges being washed out prevented buses from running this week.

A new electric water pump has been installed in the basement of the high school. It works automatically when water gets to a certain depth. Lots of surface water was in basements recently during the high water.
