Labor in Oregon Outlines Program

SALEM, Jan. 15.—(AP)—Organized labor's principal objectives during the Oregon legislative session will be to compel all employers in hazardous industries to come under the workmen's compensation law, and to maintain existing unemployment compensation taxes on employers to prevent depletion of the unemployment reserve fund. AFL and CIO members of the house said today.

Labor's plans were outlined by Rep. Phil Brady, head of the Portland Central Labor Council, and Rep. Manley J. Wilson, Wuna, a member of the CIO timber and sawmill workers union. Both are democrats.

Wilson said employers should not be allowed to take out industrial accident insurance with private companies, the result of that policy being that the private companies get the good risks and the state industrial accident commission gets the bad risks. He predicted a breakdown of the state workmen's compensation system unless all employers come under the act.

Wilson urged that the legislature follow the lead of California and Washington, which already have laws similar to that urged by Wilson.

Brady, asserting he agrees wholeheartedly with Wilson on both subjects, said labor would resist any attempts by employers to reduce the unemployment tax rate. The rate until the 1941 session was 2.7 to 4 per cent of payrolls, but it then was reduced to 1 to 2.7 per cent.

Brady said the fund, now at \$28,000,000, is not too large. "We want this fund built up more," Brady said, with Wilson concurring, "because we all know that after the war, there will be considerable unemployment, at least during a period of six months when industry is being converted from wartime to civilian production. With widespread unemployment, it wouldn't take any time at all to deplete the fund."
