

2600 Planes Sent To Russia By United States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—(AP)—Lend-Lease Administrator Ed-

ward R. Stettinius, Jr., reported today that the United States has sent approximately 2,600 airplanes to the Soviet Union—more than has been sent by lend-lease to the United Kingdom or to any other

military theater.

Reporting on United Nations aid to the Soviet Union, Stettinius said shipments of all kinds of military equipment were greatly increased after a slow start. The

United States has sent 81,000 trucks and jeeps and other motor vehicles and 3,200 tanks to the USSR, he said.
