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a rural reconstruction unit in devastated Kiangsi and Mr. Shepherd was appointed one of the co-directors of the unit. The next year when the New Life Movement was founded Mr. Shepherd was a member of its board of directors.

In 1935 Mr. Shepherd was asked by the Generalissimo to make his headquarters in Nanking as an adviser to the New Life Movement. He was there during the historic development that resulted in the unification of China, the Sian kidnapping and the July, 1937, Marco Polo Bridge attack.

When the Japanese were marching on Nanking in fateful 1937 Mr. Shepherd was sent on a special mission to England and America by the Generalissimo who recalled him to China a few months prior to the fall of Canton and Hankow.

It was at this time that Madame Chiang Kai-Shek began her now famous work for war orphans, the training of a Women's Service corps (similar to the WAACS), and engaged in the multitudinous war activities involving the sharing of the sufferings of her people in towns, factories and villages. As the Japanese broke through the outer defenses of Hankow, China's first lady asked Mr. Shepherd to assist in the evacuation of thousands of women workers and their families. With Colonel J. L. Huang he helped transport her women assistants to Chungking and other centers of Free China.

Mr. Shepherd contends that missionaries are "true scientists in the realm of human relations," and believes that these sometimes criticized workers are now providing the world with "unmistakable proof of the essential relevancy between the main factors in our several cultures."

Bronx DA Denies Charges in Hearing

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Samuel Foley, Bronx district attorney, denied emphatically before the senate foreign relations committee today that he improperly conducted a grand jury which cleared Edward J. Flynn in the so-called New York City paving block case.

Foley was the second witness as the committee resumed its investigation of Flynn's qualifications for appointment as minister to Australia. Previously, Adolph A. Berle, Jr., assistant secretary of state and former New York City chamberlain, related reports that Flynn was interested in a garage business which obtained a loan from a mortgage company from which Flynn had ordered purchases of securities while he was chamberlain in 1928.

Berle said mortgage securities bought under Flynn's direction as chamberlain went into default after Flynn had left the office and said "a good deal of what had happened had happened after Mr. Flynn left office," in telling of his findings in 1934.

Foley had been named by Senator Bridges (R-NH) in formal charges before the senate committee as a "political stooge" of Flynn's who conducted a grand jury which resulted in a "white wash" of the former democratic national chairman in connection with the paving of a courtyard at Flynn's country estate with New York City owned materials.

Memories of 1918 Stir German Public Opinion

BERN, Switzerland, Jan. 23.—(AP)—How memories of World War I are biting into German public opinion was indicated in the slogan coined by Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung in an issue received here today.

The newspaper exhorted the German people to "do the opposite of 1918."

The intimation that the war's course now is similar to that of 1918 is a suggestive psychological weapon of Germany's enemies, the Neue Zuercher Zeitung editorialized, but it added that in Nazi appeals for greater effort and greater sacrifices "one sees the ghost of 1918 appearing again."

CONFERENCE FOR CLERKS
SALEM, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The house education committee introduced a bill today to require county school superintendents to hold annual instruction conferences for district school clerks. The bill would allow \$5 annual expenses of each clerk attending the conferences.

EDITORIAL

A Christian conception of home and the home life is inevitably associated with a Christian view of marriage. It is therefore appropriate that the last lesson should be followed by this on Christian nurture in the family. The passages chosen for the lesson are significant. Two passages are drawn from the Book of Deuteronomy, far back in the history of Israel, and the third is from II Timothy in verses in which Paul commends the wise training in the Scriptures that Timothy had had from his babyhood.

The Bible from the very opening of the books to its close is a great chronicle of home and family life. Even in crude and rather violent times we have the stories of rich and beautiful experience. One thinks, for instance, of the child Samuel, devoted to the services of religion by the love and consecration of his mother. It was this same Samuel who lived in warlike times, of whom we are told "that he hewed Agag in pieces before the altar."

At a time when in our present-day life violence and horror are so adjacent to all the finer and beautiful things, we cannot cavil too much at the discrepancies of a bygone time. But we can appreciate the fact that, in spite of horror and violence in the past, rich and beautiful things have persisted, and they will survive the tragedies of the present time.

Is it too much to say that the issue of the present World War depends very much upon the quality of the home life that lies back of military service? It is sad to think of the tragedy of young lives sacrificed to war, upon which so much of love and care has been bestowed. The sacrifice, suffering, and loss to loving fathers and mothers, as well as to youth itself, is apparent. But it is the spirit of youth that comes from such homes upon which the future of the world ultimately depends.

Thoughtless leaders today are instilling hate, and are suggesting that effective military action must depend upon the measure of hate with which soldiers can be stirred to action. Such a conception, plausible as it seems, is against the experience of wars in which men have fought predominantly for a principle or a cause.

It was not hate that inspired the finest type of men who fought on both sides in our own Civil War—men like Lee and Pickett in the South, and like Grant in the North—nor was it the motive force in men who had the destiny of the nation at heart, like Lincoln.

It is doubtful whether any soldier can adequately fight for democracy who has not deep in him the consciousness that he is fighting for homes and for a way of life. It is this love of home and family and the right way of living that, more than anything else, has made men brave and irresistible in battle. It is no mere form of words that associates home and country in the noblest aspect of patriotism and service.

I often think of that young man from a Christian home, the son of a theological professor, who enlisted in the very dangerous service in the first World War. He said to his father, "You know, father, I am very timid, and I would not go into this thing if I did not believe it to be my duty." The colonel of his regiment said to the father, "I would like to have a whole regiment of soldiers like him. That boy would go through hell if he believed it to be his duty."

That is the sort of warfare that is not endangered by date, but that finds its strength and its irresistible quality in the things that are associated with Christian nurture in the home.

Alaskan Spruce Nazi Radio Admits Soviet Break-Through

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—(AP)—The safe arrival at Anacortes, Wash., of a raft containing 912,810 board feet of spruce logs has signaled the opening of a large government logging project in the Tongass national forest of Alaska, to obtain spruce needed for airplane production.

A government announcement said the 900-mile trip from Edna Bay in southeastern Alaska reportedly was interrupted by gales, during which the consignment sought shelter in coves.

The raft also contained 49,300 board feet of hemlock for experimental purposes. The United States forest service said 38 percent of the spruce was of No. 1 grade.

The service said the project was launched to meet urgent needs of the aircraft industry for aircraft lumber, as production from Washington and Oregon had not been sufficient to supply the expanding war requirements of this and other countries.

The logging was contracted for with independent companies under the direction of an office set up in Seattle. The service also contracts for the towing of the logs to Puget Sound.

Army Private Gets Promotions--In Hurry

BOISE, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Every thing seemed to be happening at once to Pvt. Blain M. Painter, 24, of Reading, Pa., who is stationed at Gowen field.

At 10 a.m. yesterday he received notification that he had been promoted to corporal; pleased, he was telling friends about it, when he received word that he had been promoted to the rank of sergeant. The time was 11 a.m.
