**U. S. Minister To Canada Dies In Ottawa**  
 OTTAWA, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Canada's capital lost one of its best-known members of its diplomatic colony when Jay Pierrepont Moffat, United States minister to Canada since 1940, died unexpectedly of pleurisy yesterday in the American legation.

Moffat, who was 46, underwent an operation three weeks ago but it was believed Saturday that he was fully recovered. He had announced that he intended to resume work at the legation today.

Early yesterday Moffat became ill again and his physician, Dr. H. T. C. Whitley, was hastily summoned. He died at about 9:30 a. m., surrounded by members of his family.

Funeral services will be held here Tuesday. The body will be cremated in Montreal and the ashes sent to the United States for burial.

Moffat, a career diplomat, came to Ottawa in 1927 as first secretary on temporary duty when the U. S. first opened a legation here. A native of Rye, N. Y., he was a son-in-law of Joseph Grew, former American Ambassador to Tokyo.

## House Approves Bill To Sell Wine At Bars

The house taxation and revenue committee rolled up its sleeves today and went to work on its taxation problems, hoping to introduce a correlated tax program within two weeks.

The committee, said Giles L. French, Moro, chairman, will meet every afternoon this week, discussing a different phase of the problem each day.

After disposing of the tax measures and appropriations, the legislature will be ready to adjourn, many members said today.

This afternoon's meeting was devoted to discussion of the bill giving surplus income tax revenues to school districts to reduce property taxes. The bill clarifies an initiative measure passed at the November election.

Tomorrow the committee will take up the state income tax, which some legislators, but not Governor Earl Snell, want reduced. Governor Snell's proposal to tax income of utilities to finance \$40 monthly old age pensions will be considered Wednesday.

Chairman Earl Hill, Cushman, of the house legislation and rules committee, served notice today that no bills may be introduced in the house after next Saturday, except emergency measures and appropriation bills. Members must get their bills in this week or be out of luck, he said. The senate has no similar rule.

## Five Persons Injured In Apartment House Fire

ASTORIA, Jan. 25.—(AP)—Damage in an Astoria apartment house fire yesterday, in which five persons were injured, was estimated today at \$18,000 by Mrs. Inez Green, the building's owner.

The injured, none of whom were hurt seriously, included one of the firemen who rescued several persons from second and third-story windows with ladders.

The blaze, starting in a garbage can on an enclosed porch, virtually destroyed the 30-year-old structure.

## Importance of India As Allied Base Seen by Analyst

NEW DELHI, Jan. 22.—(Delayed)—Looking at the world through the big end of a telescope—that is, across the flaming battlefields of Europe and Africa towards the ultimate battlefields of Asia—it seems increasingly clear that this India from which I am writing will be needed as a major base—perhaps the major base—for defeat of the Oriental Huns.

That is a fact which we shouldn't allow the smoke of the European conflict to obscure for one moment. India is vital to the allied cause.

The point is that in order to uproot and drive the Mikado's forces from the continent into the sea it will be necessary to recapture Burma and use that back door to China to equip Chiang Kai-Shek's armies. India will be at once the arsenal and strategic jumping off place for this grand finale.

Thus it is good to receive authoritative assurances such as have been given me that India's security as a base is insured. They tell me that it is being held safe, both as regards internal and external threats, unto the day when the allied high command is ready to deal finally with shotgun militarism.

I have reported previously in this column that big military personages here express the confidence that the danger of a successful Japanese invasion no longer exists.

Now we have further important information. Qualified quarters assure me that the authorities also have the internal situation securely in hand after six months of political disturbances since the breakdown of negotiations over Sir Stafford Cripps's proposals for dominion status for India.

So far as concerns the military position there is no indication, either that the Japs intend to try invasion or that if they did that they would be successful.

India has a right to feel secure in that respect.

As to the political situation, the statement that things are wholly in hand undoubtedly represents a studied view of authorities. Certainly they are the ones who should know better than any one else what the exact state of affairs is and their apparent confidence is reassuring.

Still, even though things may indeed be well in hand, I am bound to say that the position would be much happier if the political differences were eliminated.

This is a crucial moment when good will and unity of effort are essential and those things are lacking among various parties to the controversy. In that sense India cannot be the same effective military base which it would be were political difficulties solved.

Just when India will be called upon for its supreme war effort is perhaps something which even the allied high command cannot predict with certainty right now. Of course, operations are being conducted continually against the Japs in Burma and neighboring territory but it wouldn't be surprising if a grand offensive were not staged until Hitler has been knocked out.

Our oriental allies, apparently are becoming reconciled to this viewpoint, although disagreeing with the policy of making defeat of the axis in Europe the initial objective. Anyway, I find they do understand the military reasoning which designed Hitler as enemy number one, and the recent allied successes in Russia and Libya have made this reasoning much more acceptable in the Orient.

It is now becoming apparent in this part of the world that reestablishment of allied control over the Mediterranean will be of incalculable assistance to the final campaign against Japan.

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## Lower 13 Murder Case Still Baffles

no one resembling the man he said he had seen.

The murder car was returned to Albany for examination by Dr. John Beeman, chief of the state police crime detection laboratory at Portland, who here Saturday determined that the victim had not been criminally attacked.

A John Doe warrant was issued in Albany for the unidentified assailant Wilson described. It is still not known if he jumped from the train near Tangent, as indicated by an open door in a car vestibule.

Two occupants of the death car said that about 4 a. m. Saturday they heard a woman say, "I can't take this any longer," and then, "My God, he's killing me." The scream followed.

One of the men, Eugene Norton, Daly City, Calif., said he looked into the aisle immediately and saw Wilson lifting Mrs. James from her pool of blood. He told police that blood was spurting from a neck wound, and "It looked to me the wound was made by a gouge." However, Dr. Beeman said today the cut was made by a sharp instrument, possibly even a razor.

Wilson described the man who ran away as being about 35, 5 feet 10 inches in height, of a heavy build, shiny faced, smooth shaven, with kinky hair combed straight back. He said he wore a brown pin-stripe suit, that he was dark-skinned or a negro.

The man ran to the rear. A porter, called from the car next to Mrs. James' sleeper, said no one had passed that way. Police said they did not believe the trail of blood specks in the three cars behind the murder coach had been left by Wilson.

A checked brown suit was found in Funches' possession. He said he had played cards with other negro employees Friday night and retired about 1 a. m. Police said he apparently still was asleep at 4 a. m. in a car far in front of Mrs. James' sleeper.

Footprints along the railway at Tangent, where the train stopped briefly, indicated that a man had stepped off the California-bound limited and had swung aboard a northbound train, according to word from Albany. This report, however, was not confirmed.

A brakeman said he saw a negro similar to the one described by Wilson on the train between Portland and Salem. The negro was not seen after the train left Salem, 30 miles north of Tangent.
