C. M. Stienwalt Dies Wednesday In Eugene

Curtis M. Stienwalt, 76, a resident of Oregon for 30 years, died Wednesday in Eugene.

He was born Sept. 2, 1866, at Loganport, Ind., moved at the age of five with his parents to Savenburg, Kan., where he lived until entering school at Battle Creek, Mich. He married Lucy A. Moore, in Hutchinson, Minn., on Jan. 4, 1893, and they moved to Roseburg in 1913.

Since October, 1942, he and his wife had lived in Eugene at the home of their daughter, Mrs. Mabel Kirschman. He was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist church of Eugene. Besides his daughter, he is survived by a son, Earl Lewiston, Ida., and four grandchildren. The body will be shipped by Veatch-Hollingsworth to Roseburg where the service will be held Saturday at the Ritter chapel.
