aging the telephone.

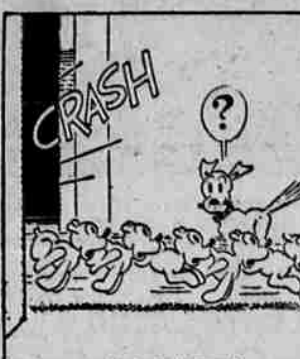
Loggers were sent back into the

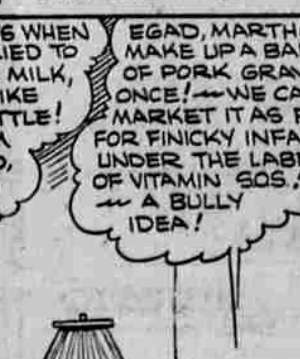

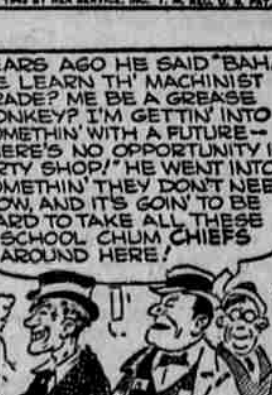
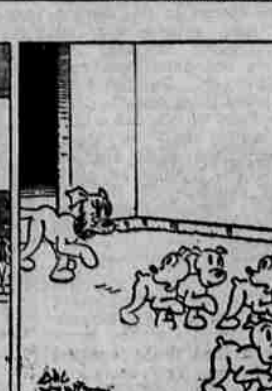
