MEDFORD, Jan. 29.—(P)—News of the death of Lieut. Robert B. Olson, former Oregon State college football star, has been received here by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. V. Olson.

The 24-year-old flyer's wife in San Francisco said she had been informed officially of his death in North African action. He had been a Flyin-Fortress pilot in Europe and North Africa for seven months.

Olson was a standout for Medford high school in 1937 before going to Oregon State.

At the Heilig:

THE MUMMY'S TOMB
NIGHT MONSTER

You either have to have a brave heart, or else a capacity to remember. Mother, it's only a play, to sit through the Heilig's duo shocker program. The casts overlap by at least two characters, but the shows manage to be different enough for continued "enjoyment."

The one about the mummy is the most horrifying. Lon Chaney, using the name of his more famous silent-star father, is Kharis, the mummy, now residing (please notice we didn't say "living") with a Manchester, Mass., cemetery caretaker, Egyptian Priest Mehmet Bey.

The diabolical but handsome young priest (Turhan Bey) wants to avenge the defiling of the tomb of his royal ancestors by a group of archaeologists, by killing them and all their descendants. The dehydrated creature, by virtue of a strange potion which makes him perennial and immune to all human-killing devices such as guns, does all the dirty work. Soon John Hubbard, as the last of the Banning family, is the only one of his prospective victims still living.

But when the priest sees Banning kissing Cover Girl Elyse Knox, his repressed deltan love pyramids into hunger for her. He tells the mummy to kidnap the gal. Mob fury ends the tale, the priest's passion, the mummy's power. Final score: seven.

"Night Monster" does even better, with eight having screamed their last before The End. Ralph Morgan is a cripple who invites his three ineffectual doctors to come over so that he can tell them about his operation. First a servant girl is strangled because she "knew too much." Then the chauffeur. (If this keeps up, everybody in the house will be gone, and the murderer will be a matter of survival as well as elimination.)

Then Don Porter, as a young who-done-it writer, and Irene Hervey, a pretty lady psychiatrist, get on the trail, "materialize" the killer (who actually already was materialized). Bela Lugosi is in offensive as the butler, and the cast and audience is full of people who don't believe the solution even when they see it take place before their eyes. Which is as it should be, and as the producers intended.

The Heilig weekend features some interesting news shots of activities in North Africa; also Chapter I of "The Adventures of Smilin' Jack," with Tom Brown as a professional aviator for a change instead of as an amateur sophomore.

If you're hoping for bad dreams, these films will give you subconscious some good material on which to improvise. Awk!

4 Merchant Ships Lost in U. S. Convoy

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 29.—(AP)—Fifty-three seamen were missing tonight as a result of the sinking of four United States merchant ships in a convoy off the northern coast of South America early this month, survivors reported on arrival here.

Sinking of the four vessels was the largest single loss of American merchantmen yet to be announced by the navy. The sinkings raised to 637 the unofficial number of Allied ship losses revealed for the western Atlantic area alone, according to United Press tabulations.

One hundred seventy-two crew members escaped from the torpedoed vessels which were sunk in the midnight surprise assault by the U-boats.

Twenty-five men were lost from a small merchantman. Twenty-three of the crew perished when the vessel sank before they could abandon it.

The newest victims—three medium-sized and one small merchantman—were struck in swift succession by the axis undersea raiders. Three of the ships were sunk while illuminated by the glow of the first one which exploded after being torpedoed.
