County Christian Endeavor Convention Friday And Saturday In Springfield

THE Lane County Christian Endeavor Union convention is to be held at the Springfield Christian church on Feb. 5 and 6 with Rev. Walter J. The convention opens at 7:00 o'clock, Friday evening with registration, then the main session will start at 7:30 with the song service led by Dick Humphreys with Jean Williams at the piano. Claude O'Brien, pastor of the Christian church at Springfield, will give the address of welcome. After the election of officers, there will be a worship service led by Shirley Coombs. At 8:30 Rev. Mr. Fiscus will speak on the theme "Our Answer—Christ."

The Saturday morning session will open with a pre-prayer service at 8:00, the regular session opening at 9:00. The afternoon session opens at 2:00, and after a song service, and a worship service led by Glenn Warner, there will be two more conferences: "Making Your Society Go," led by Marjorie Boon, state C. E. president; and "Devotional Living," led by A. B. Cromwell, professor at Northwest Christian college. There will be a junior hour at 2:30 in charge of Mrs. Walter Taylor of Springfield. The banquet will be at 6:00 with Vernon Fishback as toastmaster.

In Evening
The last session begins at 7:30, and after a song service, a budget raising session, and installation of officers, there will be a worship service led by Betty Jean Taylor; then Rev. Mr. Fiscus will bring another message. The convention will close with a candlelight decision service in charge of Rev. Mr. Fiscus, assisted by Shirley Hatfield, violinist, and Calvin Wilson, soloist.

The AFL bolters at Portland announced granting of charters to a local at Vancouver, Wash., and a special auxiliary for negro workers.

Hitler Junkel To Stalingrad Reported

MADRID, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler flew to Stalingrad early in January and, in a dramatic interview with his corps commanders there, told them they must fight on to the last man, reports from France said tonight.

Hitler was said to have decided upon the trip when the rapidity of the Russian advance on the southern front precluded the organization of any relief army.

He was accompanied by his personal chief of staff and two aides, and 25 fighter planes escorted his air craft.

At Stalingrad, Hitler was said to have called the German corps commanders and division generals into the sixth army headquarters and informed them that the fate of the fatherland depended on their fighting to the death.

It had become impossible to send a relief army to their rescue or to put into effect any other plan whereby the trapped troops could rejoin the main armies to the west, he said.

Every day the sixth army held out at Stalingrad gave the German command additional time to reorganize to stem the Soviet winter onslaught, Hitler said. Therefore it must resist to the last man without thought of surrender.

'Idle Tire' Reports Show Huge Figures
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—(AP)—Up to January 3, returns in the idle-tire program included Portland, 175,000; Seattle, 136,000; Spokane, 94,500; San Francisco, 450,000; Los Angeles, 642,600; and Salt Lake City, 95,000, the office of the rubber director has informed Representative Patman, D. Tex. The Chicago area led other cities, turning in 1,430,000 tires, with Cleveland in second place with 1,021,935. New York City stood third with 780,600 tires. A grand total of 10,242,612 tires was reported received from all cities at that time. About 50 per cent were reported suitable only for scrap.

Giraud Sees No Hope For Uniting French

ALLIED HDG. IN NORTH AFRICA, Jan. 30.—(AP)—General Henri Honoré Giraud declared today that there were no prospects of any single united French movement at the present time and that the only agreement between himself and General Charles de Gaulle would be one "of liaison on military, economic and financial matters." Giraud, high commissioner for French North and West Africa, told a press conference that he had not taken up "the question of politics" with the leader of the Fighting French when the two were brought together during the Roosevelt-Churchill conference at Casablanca.

Rev. G. W. Royall, Toronto, Canada, who has just returned from Occupied China, will be guest speaker in a special missionary rally at the Church of the Nazarene, Eighth and Madison street, Sunday at 7:30 o'clock.

The Church of the Nazarene in Chao-Cheng, Shantung Province in China, where Rev. Mr. Royall and his family spent the past five years, was one of more than a hundred American church properties destroyed by Japanese bombs. Rev. Mr. Royall has a silver from a 500-pound Japanese bomb that destroyed the church of which he was pastor.

Rev. Royall is the author of several books, including "Enemies of the Middle Kingdom," "Missionary Missions," and "Thinking Yellow." He is one of the few Occidentals to have ever successfully composed Chinese poetry. The public is invited to attend the rally.
