Pictures of Longfellow To Be in Book by University Professor

Three pictures of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, famous American poet, will appear in a book by Carl Leonard Johnson, assistant professor of Romance languages at the University of Oregon, to be published by the university press.

Permission to use the pictures was gained from Henry Wadsworth Longfellow Dana, Boston, grandson of the poet. One portrait, painted by Franquetin in 1839, shows Longfellow three years after he went to Harvard.

Another is of Cornelius Felton, professor of Greek at Harvard, and Longfellow's best friend. The third picture depicts Harvard alumni marching from First Parish church to the Harvard yard on the 200 anniversary of Harvard university.
