FORTY-SECOND LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY—REGULAR SESSION

House Bill No. 214

Introduced by Representatives E. HILL, CHASE and SNELLSTROM and
Senators WHEELER and GIBSON and read first time January 28, 1943

A BILL

For an act to provide for the taxation of the properties of municipal cor-
porations employed in supplying electric service to the public.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. All property, real and personal, owned, used, operated
or controlled by any municipal corporation in or for the production,
transmission, distribution or furnishing of electric power or energy or
electric service to the public, shall be assessed and taxed in the same
manner and for the same purposes, and such municipal corporation and
the officers thereof shall be subject to the same requirements, as provid-
ed by law in respect to assessment and taxation of similar property
owned, used, operated or controlled by a private corporation or individ-
ual for the purpose of furnishing electric power or energy or electric ser-
vice to the public.

If this measure passes, approximately 20% of the income of
your electric utility will be taken for taxes.

Remember! Taxes must always be passed on to the ultimate
consumer—so Ask Yourself These Four Questions:

1. Why does the bill SINGLE OUT the 10 ELECTRIC utilities
of Oregon for special legislation?
2. Why weren't the more than 200 municipal water systems
—with taxable valuation of at least 10 times that of elec-
tric systems—included?
3. Why were not all other revenue producing municipal
properties included?
4. Do I want to give up the advantages to myself and the
community of the lowest electric rates in Oregon?
