Funeral services will be held from the Methodist church at Drain, Sunday at 2 p. m., with the Rev. Merrill Fox officiating. Interment will be in the Yoncalla cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Stearns Mortuary.

history, English, American history, toughness and physical fitness, and encouragement of special abilities through highly technical courses.

Math Needed

He said that the University and all other institutions of higher education in the U. S. had to overcome the lack of high school mathematics training; that many military experts who are in the army urged liberal arts (basic or fundamental) education for the colleges, with view that the armed forces could impart the technical information and training after the students go into service.

Dr. Erb said that higher education would keep liberal arts in a central position, but that after the war it will go on a "slant toward an internationalist (rather than a national) era, unless I miss my guess. If this isn't true, there's going to be a mighty short space between wars.

In war time, the speaker stated, the school is faced with the problem of arranging its curriculum to fit the needs of both those who will go into the armed service and those who will go into war industry or other work, just as in peacetime, the schools have to arrange the curriculum to fit those who are going to work immediately after graduation and those who are going on to higher education.

Dr. Cramer averred that that problem could not only be applied to EHS but to every other high school in the U. S. He encouraged parents not to worry about whether young men after the war would be able to enter college after the pattern of study that they will have had. He agreed with the military that vocational subjects should be made an integral, rather than an "extra" or supplementary, part of schooling.

"When your boy gets out of school, he won't have only bare hands, he will have skilled hands," he said. "Pre-induction training is a matter of life or death to our boys."

Mr. Johnson and Mrs. Constance reiterated some of the points made by Dr. Erb and Dr. Cramer, said that vocational training was a "compelling duty" of the schools at present and that such activities and classes which have been replaced by vocational work are in keeping with the general "giving up" practice of all civilian life today, when war work such as civilian defense comes foremost.

Among other participants in the program were Walter H. Banks, Mrs. Carl Pfeiffer, Mrs. George Spicer, Miss Ruth Cox, all of whom asked and answered questions, a few of which were out of the audience.

Auto License Power Bill Passes Senate

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 19.—(AP)—Motorists, throughout Oregon who return to their steering wheels after the war were deeply concerned today following passage in the senate of the most all-inclusive and sharpest toothed motor vehicle bill which has come up during the 1943 session.

The bill, approved, 24-6, would give Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., the power to suspend and revoke the driving licenses and car plates of drivers "upon any reasonable grounds."

The author of the measure, Sen. Rex Ellis of Pendleton, explained that it would "eliminate irresponsible persons from the highways of Oregon" and provide innocent victims of automobile accidents with at least monetary compensation. Any driver responsible for damages of over \$25 who could not meet his liability would face cancellation of his license.

Baker's Sen. W. H. Strayer launched the opposition, claiming the insurance companies were the force behind the bill.

He said that in the state of New York, the automobile insurance business had increased from 30 to 70 per cent under a similar law.

Strayer, referring to the secretary of state, said, "this bill would give Hitler-like power to an individual. It's a wonder that the bill doesn't affect Germany, also." Last year there were 49,000 accidents in Oregon, Strayer said. "Shall we delegate the power to pass on 49,000 cases to one man," he asked.

Home-Made Brooders Needed In County

Calls for home-made brooders from poultry raisers in communities where there is no electricity have been received by O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Such brooders are not to be found on the market any place, the county agent says and those needing them will have to build their own.

Mr. Fletcher has received a suggestion from the state college that feather brooders be made and placed in a room heated by a stove of some sort. There are a number of such brooders in Lane county and the county agent suggests that the owners notify him of their location so that anyone interested may go and see them.

Three-Year Journalism Course Now Available At University Of Oregon

Oregon high school graduates and other qualified persons, particularly women, will have an opportunity to complete four years of journalistic training and be at work on state newspapers within three years under an emergency speed-up program to be initiated by the school of journalism here. A special two-year course will be available to persons interested in journalism who have an acceptable education background.

The program, announced by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism, is an effort to meet the acute shortage of available newspaper personnel in the state. Demands for qualified reporters, editors, and photographers have exceeded the supply for the past two years, he said.

"Newspapers are essential to the war program and we are stepping up the training to help meet the acute shortage of qualified journalists available to Oregon newspapers and associations. This should be a worthwhile opportunity for every high school graduate, particularly women, who have ever considered journalism as a career," Dean Allen said.

The shortened program will take advantage of summer sessions and more intensive class work.

Japs Move into China From Lashio Area

CHUNGKING, Feb. 19.—(AP)—Ten thousand Japanese troops moving up from the Lashio area of Burma are attacking Chinese positions along the Salween river near the Burma road, a communiqué said today.

The fighting was the first reported in the Salween region in several months.

(The London radio quoted Chinese military reports as saying the Chinese are ready for widespread Japanese drives against their key points. It also said a Japanese army spokesman had announced that Japan is taking all possible measures to crush the Chungking government.)

(The official Japanese Domei news agency broadcast a claim that about 30,000 Chinese troops had been trapped in southern Hupeh province and are being annihilated.)

The Chinese high command said today that ten Japanese gunboats were assisting continued enemy landings in the bay area of French-leased Kwangchowwan on the China sea west of Hong Kong but that Chinese troops were preventing enemy progress.

Representative Wants Washington, Oregon To Buy Columbia Dams

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—(AP)—The federal government would be required to sell Grand Coulee and Bonneville dams to Washington state and Oregon under a bill (HB1899) introduced today by Representative Norman (R., Wn.).

"I strongly believe in home rule on public power," Norman said in a statement. "Initiative No. 12, now before the Washington state legislature, is a step in that direction. My new bill is the final step toward complete home rule by the people of my state over their hydro-electric resources." (Initiative No. 12 was passed by the legislature Wednesday.)

Washington state would receive sovereignty over Grand Coulee and Washington and Oregon jointly the sovereignty over the Bonneville project.

Need for More Dams On Columbia Seen

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 19.—(AP)—If the demand for Columbia river power continues to increase at its present rate, says Bonneville Administrator Paul J. Raver, the proposed Umatilla rapids dam should be producing in 1945.

He urged last night that construction be started immediately and that additional generating capacity be provided for existing dams. He said he would urge the Bonneville advisory board to make that recommendation to the war production board.

"It takes months to build and install new generators of the giant type used at Grand Coulee," the administrator said in prepared statement after receiving a report from the Bonneville division of system planning and marketing. "It will take a minimum of nearly three years to bring into production a new dam such as that proposed for Umatilla rapids on the Columbia."

The report shows, he said, that at the present rate of regional load growth power from Umatilla dam will be needed before the close of 1945.

Raver advocated a quick method of obtaining an additional 120,000 kilowatts. Install eight more generators at Rock Island dam on the upper river near Wenatchee, he said. The dam now has four units generating 80,000 kilowatts.
