

Sheriff Reports on February Activities

The number of prisoners listed at the county jail during the month of February was 497, the number of meals served was 942 and the cost was \$215.18, which averages 23 cents to the meal, the report of Sheriff O. E. Crowe for the month shows.

The total number of arrests during the month was 23 and 72 investigations were made by the sheriff and his deputies. Of the total of 195 cases handled 97 were civil, 75 criminal and 23 miscellaneous. The total number of miles traveled on official business was 3630, of which 1048 were for civil cases, 2382 for criminal cases and 390 miscellaneous. The officers spent 1654 hours on official business, 111 of them being on civil cases, 943 on criminal business, 628 on miscellaneous business and 672 were spent on duty at the jail.

Alvin Craine Held By Japanese Captors

Pvt. Alvin Roy Craine, 20, of Cottage Grove, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Craine, is a Japanese prisoner on the Philippine Islands, according to a war department telegram received last week-end by his parents. He was taken prisoner with the fall of Corregidor. Pvt. Craine was a Junior at Cottage Grove high school when mobilized with the national guard.

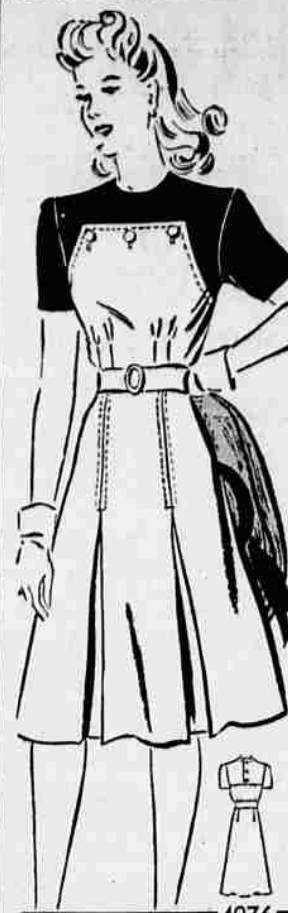
Victory Parties Held By 4-H Club Members

Food Budgets To Be Discussed At Class

The federally sponsored course on Food Preservation and Victory Gardening conducted at the River Road Women's Club building each Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 8 to 10 o'clock will enter its second week this Tuesday evening when Mrs. Genevieve Nettleton will take up the problem of balancing the food budget. In addition, the film "Hidden Hunger" will be shown.

Thursday evening, Mr. Elmo Chase, Eugene's garden expert, will discuss varieties to plant in the victory garden and will demonstrate starting seed in flats. Testing of garden soils for lime and phosphorus content will also be featured.

A request for the same course has been received by M. C. Buchholz, agricultural instructor at the Eugene high school.

Salvation Army Burns Mortgage On Property At Annual Meeting

March will be a memorable month in the future for the Eugene corps of the Salvation Army, because, during the past week the group burned the \$1285 mortgage on the property at Seventh and Pearl streets, the ceremony taking place at the annual meeting and dinner for the advisory board.

The mortgage was expected to have been liquidated by small yearly payments, but Adjutant Carl Duell went to work to raise the full amount from sources outside the city of Eugene.

The financial report showed income for the year to have been as follows: Collections from dues and donations, \$4,048.67; annual maintenance campaign or community chest, \$4,234.22; income from other sources, \$4,192.51, for a total income of \$12,475.40.

Disbursements have been \$11,323.97, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,391.04 to carry on. The statement does not include value of material received and distributed to clients but does include cost of collection and distribution of same.

Service Listed
The welfare and Christian character-building report for Eugene and Lane county, for the year ending Sept. 30, showed the following statistics:
Family service: 537 families given food, clothing, shoes, furniture, medical attention, of 1670 individuals.

Transient service: 1485 given lodging, meals, clothing.

Christmas: 137 families, 632 persons, provided food, clothing, gifts; 94 singles to restaurants.

Employment: 303 placements, total of 492 applications.

Hospitalization: 15 unmarried mothers and babies given 1146 days care at the White Shield

High School Boys Eligible for V-12

High school seniors, high school graduates, and college students who appear to have potentialities for selection as officers are to be chosen for college training under a new program, known as V-12, of the U.S. army.

Examinations for applicants will be held at Eugene high school from 9 to 11 a. m. on Friday, April 2.

Harry B. Johnson, EHS principal who received details on V-12 Saturday, said that the program will be open to men in the three mentioned classes who will attain their 17th but not their 20th birthdays by July 1, 1943. Applicants must be male citizens, morally and physically qualified, unmarried and agree to remain unmarried until commissioned, and evidence potential officer qualifications, including appearance and scholarship records.

Men now enlisted in any branch of the armed services, including V-1, V-5, V-7 reserves on inactive status, are not eligible to take the test. Men accepted will carry on college training while on active duty, in uniform, receiving pay, and under general military discipline.

It is possible that the test may be given at other places in the county besides Eugene high, but none are announced. Application forms are to be available at the high school.

Leader Training Meetings Scheduled

Two neighborhood leader training meetings will be held in the county this week. It was announced Saturday by Miss Nellie C. Lyle, county home demonstration agent.

The first one will be held at the Goshen grange hall Monday at 8 p.m. and the subject will be "Victory Gardens and Planning the Family Food Supply." Certificates will be awarded to leaders at this time. The other meeting will be held Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock at the Jefferson school at Cottage Grove for Silk Creek, Saginaw, London, Latham, Culp Creek, Raw River, Brumbaugh and Dorcas precinct leaders.

The Irving home extension unit will meet Tuesday at 10:30 a.m. in the grange hall. Project leaders will conduct the demonstration on mending.

Neighborhood Event Set At Deernhorn

Two Men From Here Taken To U.S. Court

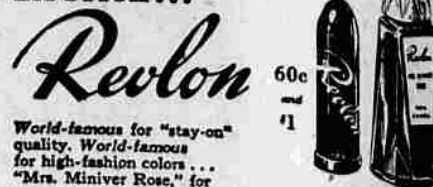
Earl Albert Gillott, arrested at Wicopee a few days ago on a charge of violating the selective service act, and a man by the name of Tate, whose first name
