New York Markets

NEW YORK, March 13—(AP)—Stocks churned at a rapid rate in today's market but, while there was a liberal sprinkling of 2-year highs, many leaders were unable to get anywhere. Trends wavered after a good start and quotations near the close were irregular. Large blocks of low and medium-priced issues helped put volume at around 800,000 shares, one of the largest aggregates for Saturday since late 1941.

Pleasant earnings statements bolstered a number of favorites and divided hopes aided others. Bell Aircraft was an isolated strong spot at a 1942-43 top. In the "new high" division on one time or another—several eventually stumbled—were Satis 7, Goodyear, U. S. Rubber and Douglas Aircraft. Ahead of the time were Westinghouse, Southern Pacific, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, United Aircraft, and J. C. Penney. Bonds and commodities were mixed.
