Corney Misses 16 In Last Civilian Try

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13.—(AP)—Lenny Cornelius Warmerdam left for the naval pre-flight officers' training school at Chapel Hill, N. C. today with his dream of clearing 16 feet in the pole vault still unrealized.

The Piedmont, Cal., high school teacher climbed to 15 feet 1 1/2 inches in the Olympic Club's annual indoor meet last night, then missed three attempts at 15 feet 9 3/4 inches. It marked the 30th time he had exceeded 15 feet, however, and also established new meet and civic auditorium records.

As far as the 4000 fans were concerned, the show was stolen by 16-year-old Murry Collins of Abraham Lincoln high school in San Jose, Cal. The freckled-faced, 135-pound Irish lad defeated some of the Pacific Coast's top college competitors in winning the mile in 4:32.8.

Collins, never heard of before last night, put on a last lap drive which enabled him to finish three yards in front of Ralph Dewey of the University of California and Cadet Bob Forsman of the St. Mary's Navy Pre-Flight school.

Warren Smith of Southern California, ranked with Dewey as one of the country's best milers, wound up far down in the pack.

The meet was not scored. Unofficially, Stanford ran up 27 points on a 5-3-1 basis for first place, followed by San Jose State with 14 and California and Fresno State with nine each. St. Mary's Pre-Olympic Club and Southern California six each.

Klamath, Baker To Meet In Finals Harrisburg Wins In 'B' Division

SALEM, March 13.—(AP)—Baker of Eastern Oregon and Klamath Falls of Southern Oregon meet tonight for the state high school basketball title.

The tall, hard-driving Baker team dethroned Astoria last night, 29-24, and the lanky Klamath Falls quintet eliminated Pendleton, 38-27.

In "B" division play Harrisburg ousted Union, 31-20, and Warrenton shaded Powers, 27-26, in an overtime session. The winners meet tonight for the "B" championship.

After three hard-fought quarters, Baker finally cracked a tight Astoria defense in the final period to score 12 points and pin the first defeat of the year on the defending champions, who compiled a string of 19 victories and were seeking an unprecedented third consecutive title.

Baker showed a strong defense of its own and held a first quarter 8-6 lead. By the end of the second period the count was up only to 9-9 and at the end of the third quarter Baker trailed, 18-17, after losing Guard Ballantyne, who injured his ankle. Forward Paul Sowers paced the winners with 12 points.

Klamath Falls, badly off in shooting accuracy, nevertheless led all the way against Pendleton. The Pelicans were ahead, 13-8, at the half and 23-18 at the end of the third quarter. They steadied in the final period to lengthen their advantage over the shorter Buckaroos. Jim Cox of the Pelicans was high scorer with 12 points.

It will be the second appearance in the finals for each team. Baker won the title in 1938 and Klamath Falls lost out in the 1934 finals. Harrisburg had little trouble disposing of the taller Union team in the "B" semi-finals.

Warrenton and Powers were never separated by more than two points, however, and regular play ended, 24-24. With seven seconds to go in the overtime period Patterson, a Warrenton reserve, tipped in a rebound for the victory.

Salem, March 13.—(AP)—St. Helens won fourth place in the Oregon state high school basketball tournament today, defeating Eugene, 35 to 24.

Powers of Coos county swamped Union 50-24 to win third place in the "B" division. Powers held a big lead throughout the game, being in front 28-7 at the half.

The strong St. Helens defense combined with poor shooting by the losers held Eugene to only 3 points in each of the two final quarters.

Eugene started strong building up a 10-5 lead by the end of the first period. But from there on, it was all St. Helens.

St. Helens took the lead early in the second quarter, but a Eugene rally tied it up at 18-all at the half.

Al Wolf's field goal put Eugene ahead at the start of the third period, and the lead changed hands four times in the next three minutes. Then St. Helens took a 27-21 lead at the end of the third period.

Eugene had the ball most of the final period, and had many shots at the basket. But, because of a stubborn defense, the Axemen had to shoot too quickly and thus missed.

Baseball Gets Off To Uncertain Start As Weather And Draft Call Two Strikes

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP)—Enveloped in uncertainty and long underwear, the 1943 Major league training season—most stringent conditioning pageant in the history of modern baseball—will be opened formally and perhaps frigidly next week by 11 of the 16 clubs.

A week later, the other five outfits will begin grooming—also north of the "Eastman-Landis" line.

This Ersatz Extravaganza of athletic preparation is a war-time refugee from the warmth of the southland and California. Not only are the substitute sites far removed from Florida and Southern Cal., but the casts for the pageant have last season, and still are subject to such changes, that the number of identities of the spear-carriers still are uncertain.

Take the Cleveland Indians and the St. Louis Browns, for example. Both clubs were being roundly congratulated for having weathered the draft robustly. But with in a few days each outfit lost two key men. The Indians were tapped for first baseman Les Fleming and second-sacker Ray Mack. The Browns lost outfielders Walt Judnich and Owen McQuillen.

As the squads trek toward their northern quarters, managers are gnawing their fingernails to the quick and wondering what men will be left in camp—who will be the survivors that the pilots can worry about as they try to limber up in the possibly inclement northern spring weather.

For the players themselves, this trip to the camps will be a journey into uncertainty. Many of them are wondering about their draft classifications as they travel—probably in day coaches and overcoats and long underwear feature their wardrobes instead of the usual Palm Beach suits and sum-

mere sports outfits.

Anyhow, the training season opens next week, and even though the early workouts are greeted with icy winds and sleet, the innovations should provide green pastures for the baseball writers—determined fellows who always are seeking new angles.

Baseball Gets Off To Uncertain Start As Weather And Draft Call Two Strikes

Bivens Decisions Tami Mauriello

NEW YORK, March 13.—(AP)—Jimmy Bivens, a sleek, long-armed Cleveland negro, had too much speed and dynamite Friday night for young Tami Mauriello of the Bronx as he registered another 10-round decision over Tami before more than 20,000 fans in Madison Square Garden.

This jam-packed crowd came partially to see the return bout between the young heavyweights and partially to see Corp. Barney Ross of the U. S. Marine Corps who was presented with the Edward J. Neil Memorial plaque for being boxing's "Man of the Year."

Bivens, who had registered a disputed decision over Mauriello at Cleveland in September, had the rugged Bronx Italian several times on the verge of a kayo but Tami refused to go down and fought back so gamely that one of the judges voted him a draw.

Mauriello was making a grand battle of it until the fifth round when smaller Jimmy's long jabs and steaming hooks to the head slowed him up. Bivens gave him a terrific head battering in the sixth and had him staggering from rope to rope. Tami rallied gamely just before the bell. Bivens lost the seventh on a foul for a flagrant low blow, but he almost put the dark-haired Italian away with a right uppercut that lifted Tami nearly off his feet.

In this session Bivens gashed Mauriello's left brow badly. Many of the fans wondered if Mauriello could come out for the eighth round.

The pace slowed in the eighth although Bivens again had his larger opponent groggy at the end. Mauriello surprised by rallying to gain a slight edge in the ninth by virtue of jabs and body smashes. Bivens won the 10th by a wide margin, battering Tami about the ring but unable to put him out.

A record field of 421 athletes will participate in the 27-event meet at the University of Chicago fieldhouse today.

Twenty-four colleges and 12 universities will compete, all Big Ten schools except, Minnesota, Iowa and Ohio State, are entered.
