

# 'Honeymoon' Stars Grant And Rogers

Bringing together for the first time two top stars of the screen, Ginger Rogers and Cary Grant, RKO Radio offers a stirring glimpse of love against a world at war in Leo McCarey's "Once Upon a Honeymoon."

The film is now at the Heilig and will be moved to the Mayflower starting Thursday. Using as his theme the light-hearted, gay type of romantic sparring for which he is famous, McCarey has invested his picture with gripping dramatic meaning by backgrounding it against Nazi world-ambitions in Europe and the successive sweeps into Austria and Poland and France.

Grant plays the part of an American newspaper correspondent and broadcaster, watching interestedly as the situation comes to a crisis. Miss Rogers is cast as an American dancer in Europe who succumbs to the glamor of a suave German baron and marries him, just as Austria falls to Hitler.

Interested in the Baroness personally and in the Baron because things begin to happen whenever he goes to a new country, the newspaperman follows the two around, lands in Warsaw with them just as the Polish blitz begins, and finally convinces the Baroness that her husband is a clever Nazi agent and not the type of man she should stay married to.

# Joan Co-Stars With Wayne

The queen of sophisticated glamour, Joan Crawford, returns to the screen after an absence of several months in a new adventure romance, "Reunion in France," which will open Thursday at the McDonald for a three-day run.

Miss Crawford has two co-stars playing opposite her, John Wayne, who plays an RAF aviator shot down over France, and Philip Dorn, who portrays a powerful French official who collaborates with the Nazis after the fall of France.

Time of the drama is just after Dunkirk, when Parisians either fled or stayed to take what the Germans had to offer. The excitement features Reginald Owen, Albert Basserman, John Carradine, Ann Ayars, and J. Edward Bromberg as members of the supporting cast.

"Reunion in France" will be co-featured with "Over My Dead Body," mystery comedy featuring Milton Berle and Mary Beth Hughes.

Plot of the comedy is laid in a small college town, where affairs of faculty and their wives rule the roost—or pretend to. Rejected from this social circle because she is rather dim-witted, Adelaide Willifer (Florence Shumaker), wife of an English professor (Robert D. Horn), makes a bid for recognition by buying the unpublished novel of a penniless novelist (Glenn Hasselrooth). When the publishers receive Dr. Willifer's "Introduction to English Literature," they forget all about it, concentrate on the novel submitted by Adelaide.

Queen of the clubwomen (Gerda Brown) rallies to her acclaim, but the college president (Ethan Newman) and another professor (Robert W. Earl) register protests. Then a publicity man (Ken Griffith) appears, convinces them they should make Adelaide a "Lady of Letters"—all for a book she hasn't even read!

Involved in the hilarity are Valleta Arthurs as the professor's daughter, Sylvia Cuthbert as the Swedish maid, Genevieve Tugman as Adelaide's mother, Dee Knollin as the author's sponsor, Joyce Coffee as a reporter.
