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## Channel Shipping Hit By English Bombers

LONDON, April 6.—(AP)—RAF fighters and Royal navy planes attacked enemy shipping off the French coast last night, damaging three merchant vessels and two small escorting craft, the air ministry news service announced today, but Germany and occupied Europe apparently were given a respite after 72 hours of terrific pounding by allied airmen.

One navy plane, the news service said, bombed one medium and two small ships about 10 miles north of Dieppe, hitting the target with all its bombs and setting the leading craft afire.

Four enemy "R-boats" were reported attacked with cannonfire near Le Touquet, and flashes of flame were said to have followed hits on two of them.

RAF fighter planes returned over the channel from the direction of northern France today, indicating new attacks on the German-occupied continent. Bombers also were believed to have been among the planes but they were hidden in clouds and only the heavy hum of their motors could be heard.

U. S. army headquarters announced today that photographs showed Fortresses and Liberators made many direct hits on the Eria plane engine works in the Antwerp raid yesterday and that the resulting fires burned out the main building.

Many other buildings were set afire and heavy explosives damaged several parts of the plant.

The nearby Gervart photographic products plant, northwest of the Eria works, also was badly hit and the main building set afire.

The Eria plant was a small target compared with the great Breda factory outside Paris so successfully bombed by American aerial fighters Sunday, but is an important depot for repairing single-engine German fighter planes operating on the western front. In peacetime, the plant manufactured Minerva automobiles.

## Outsiders Buy Lane County Farm Tracts

A number of outside people have bought Lane county farms in the past few days through the Oregon Settlement association.

## Junior Marines Plan Pick-up of Tied Paper

The second drive for paper as part of the nation's salvage campaign will come this week-end in Eugene under sponsorship of the Junior Marines and the county salvage committee.

Anyone having "about 500 pounds" of paper and magazines may call 1845, and a truck will pick it up Saturday. Those having smaller amounts may take them to the salvage depot in the alley east of High street between Seventh and Eighth avenues. No paper will be accepted unless it is tied in bundles, according to Sgt. L. L. Pittenger, marine recruiter working with Salvage Chairman J. J. Kamerman.

The new call is for a railroad carload of paper. From the pick-up held March 27, the Junior Marines have realized \$100 as payment for the paper collected. This money will go into the fund for future expenses of the juvenile group, and if enough money can be raised in the second pick-up, uniforms may be purchased. About 45 tons of paper can be used in the new drive, it is announced.

## War Prisoners May Work On U. S. Farms

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Possibility that German and Italian war prisoners may be used to help meet the farm labor shortage was disclosed in testimony made public today by the senate appropriations committee.

Wayne H. Darrow, director of the agriculture department labor administration, said at a closed hearing March 22, however, that while plans are incomplete the war department believes the program would be difficult because of the necessity of guarding the prisoners and furnishing camp equipment.
