**American-Born Japs Reported To Be Loyal**

SEATTLE, April 13. — (AP) — American-born Japanese who have spent nearly all their lives in the United States have proved loyal in virtually every instance in four relocation centers under his supervision, R. B. Cozzens, assistant director of the war relocation authority, said yesterday. Those who were taken back to Japan for education before they reached the age of 10 have proved the most troublesome ones, he said in a post-intelligence interview. "Not all the Kabis (American-born) who returned to Japan for education are disloyal by intent," Cozzens explained. "All of the men who volunteered to go to the army, to serve as Japanese language instructors for the

soldiers, were naturally from this class. "But most of the instructors are men who had spent most of their boyhood in this country. They were so disgusted with conditions in Japan, after they had been accustomed to America, that there wasn't a chance of indoctrinating them."

Relocation centers under Cozzens' administration are Tule Lake and Manzanar, California, and Poston and Rivers, Arizona.

**Landon Says FD Will Not Retire Voluntarily**

NEW YORK, April 13. — (AP) — Alf M. Landon, 1936 republican candidate for president and former governor of Kansas, said in an interview in the New York Times today that "it is perfectly evident that the president will never leave the White House voluntarily."

Landon said also that the present federal administration failed to foresee the need for production of food and oil.

"The trouble with the food situation is with the bureaucracy," the times quoted Landon as saying. "x x x Like all bureaucracies, they were not able to adjust themselves to new conditions."

He said that restrictions on winter wheat acreage were not lifted until February after the planting time had passed—and that the oil industry was producing "200,000 barrels less a day than we were before the bureaucracy put on restrictions x x x"

Landon's remark concerning the White House came in the course of a discussion on the offer of Harrison E. Spangler, republican national chairman to agree to a short presidential campaign if Frank C. Walker, democratic national chairman, would guarantee President Roosevelt would not be that party's candidate for a fourth term.

**Blood Plasma From Apples!**

WASHINGTON, April 13. — (AP) — Blood plasma from apples was seen as definite possibility today by agriculture department scientists.

C. F. Speth, assistant chief of the bureau of agricultural chemistry and engineering, told a house agriculture appropriations committee that research work in the department's laboratories on pectin, a derivative of apples and citrus fruits, had led to tests "which we have reason to believe will prove satisfactory" the use of pectin to supplement supplies of blood plasma.

"It seems," Speth told the committee, "that there will be quite a problem to get enough blood from the donors to really meet the needs for this material when we come to have a real casualty list."

**Pre-Easter Cantata To Be Sung Thursday**

"Olivet to Calvary," a pre-Easter cantata by J. H. Maunders, will be presented Thursday evening at 7:30 o'clock at the First Christian church by the church's choir and the chorus from Northwest Christian college, 80 voices.

"The March to Calvary" is one of the outstanding choruses from the cantata. It pictures the Saviour King going forth to die. The joyous scene on the way to Jerusalem, the mob scene of those who crucify Him, and the hymn in the garden of Gethsemane are all presented in the music.

Maud Skaggs Woodyard is director of the combined choirs, Neil Murphy Dickson is organist and Rosemary Fishback, pianist.

**79,900 Added To U. S. Payroll In January**

WASHINGTON, April 13. — (AP) — Employment in the executive branch of the federal government rose almost three per cent from January to February, 1943, or a net increase of 79,900 employees, it was announced today.

This brought the total of federal executive branch employees to 2,943,900.

**Willamette Vetch Will Be Inspected**

The farm crops department of the Oregon State college soon will send a representative to Lane county to inspect fields of Willamette vetch entered by their owners for seed certification, it was announced Tuesday by O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

Fletcher recently wrote to all farmers thought to be growing Willamette vetch, asking them to apply for certification on or before April 12. He has received so far applications from 18 farmers for 479 acres of the vetch. The county agent will continue to take applications until the inspector arrives. Anyone who expects

to have the Willamette variety of vetch certified is asked to apply at the agent's office.
