

Revenue Office Now Serves 7 Counties

The internal revenue office in Eugene has been designated as a major zone office and will serve the taxpayers of Lane, Lincoln, Benton, Linn, Coos, Curry, and Douglas counties. It is announced

by Fred L. Huber, now in charge as principal zone deputy.

Creed V. Brattain, Eugene resident for 10 years and in charge of the Eugene office the past four months, has been transferred to Portland where he will be chief of the victory tax division and the proposed withholding provisions of the income tax. Mrs. Brattain and children will remain here un-

til close of the school year. Bruce V. Ewen, serving here the last two years, will remain in this district. Irving H. Curran, formerly in charge of the Marshfield office, has been transferred to Eugene and will service part of Lane, Lincoln, and Benton. Charles L. Dockendorff, internal revenue agent, has been transferred to Eugene from Spokane. Dolores M. Hunter has been appointed office deputy.

Huber said that two more deputies probably will be appointed soon to the Eugene zone office, located at 207 Postoffice building with hours of 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. each day.
