Mayors Will Meet With County Court

County Judge Clinton Hurd has called a meeting of mayors of all cities in Lane county to discuss the question of county road tax levies as they affect the cities. A letter has been sent the mayors, asking them to meet with the county court at the courthouse Saturday at 10 a. m.

The reason for the meeting is that the court's attention has been called to the fact that there is a clause in the city charters of Eugene and Springfield that appears to indicate the court does not have the right to levy a tax against property within these cities for road purposes, which has been done for many years past. The court has always levied a three-mill tax on property in the whole county, including the cities, for roads. The law provides that half of the amount raised by the levy on property inside the cities has to be returned to them, the cities to use the money for street purposes.

Last year nearly \$20,000 was returned to the city of Eugene from this tax and the amount turned back to Springfield was

approximately \$1700. County Judge Hurd in his letter to the different mayors calls attention to the fact the court will be unable to levy his tax against the cities in the future and they will have to budget and collect the tax themselves.
