Council Holds Annual Meet Here Monday

The annual meeting of Eugene's Community Council of Religious Education is scheduled for Monday at 7:45 p.m. in the fellowship room at the Methodist church. In addition to election of officers, the council will consider plans for the coming year. Hospitality to visiting soldiers and activities designed to offset juvenile delinquency are topics included in the program.

A special report on the week-day church school will be presented by A. B. Cromwell and other members of the committee in charge of this work, and will include a report of the church school program in local junior high schools, inaugurated this year.

The nominating committee which will report at this meeting is comprised of Rev. V. T. Speece, Mrs. S. H. Wilcox, and G. Bernhard. Retiring officers are Jesse H. Bond, president; Kenneth Tobias, vice-president; and A. F. Holmer, secretary-treasurer. The council represents 21 Eugene churches and church-sponsored agencies.

New State Football Plan To Be Adopted

Both the OHSAA board of control and the state prep coaches association approved a plan for state championship football at meetings held here Friday.

The proposal is to have championship playoffs for class "A" and "B" schools, as well as six-man football for the smaller schools who compete in the sport. The state would be divided into four sections with semi-finalists, selected by a coaches' committee, playing on Armistice Day, and the championships being played Thanksgiving Day.

The plan cannot be put into operation until 1944, however, due to the lateness of the next general assembly meeting in December. The group must pass on the recommendations of the two groups.

The coaches elected Orville Red Bailey of Marshfield as president, Marbie Cook of Beaverton as vice-president, and Frank Ramsey of Klamath Falls as secretary of the association.

Jessup KO'd In 60 Seconds by Armstrong

BOSTON, May 8.—(P)—Hammerin' Henry Armstrong, the only triple champion in boxing history, Saturday hastened toward the next stopping-off place on his sensational comeback tour, leaving behind the wreckage of the ambitious hopes of Tommy Jessup of Springfield.

After warming up by shadow boxing in his dressing room for 20 minutes at the Boston Garden Friday night, the crafty Armstrong generated such fistic heat that he knocked out Jessup in 60-seconds flat in what was scheduled as a 10-round bout.

Jessup, who had flattened all but three of his previous 27 opponents in speedy fashion, was unable to lay a glove on the former ruler of three divisions.

Armstrong, who appeared to be as fit as he was before his retirement, weighed 140, two pounds more than the over-matched Jessup.

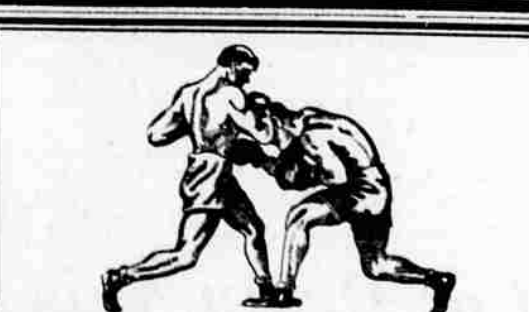

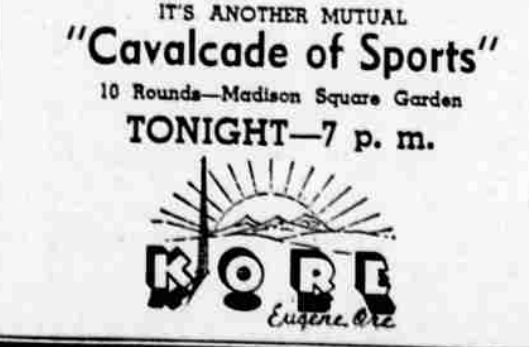
