Budget Presented At School Meeting

JUNCTION CITY — The annual budget of Junction City grade school was presented by the board to members of the budget committee at the special meeting held in the grade school building Monday evening.

The total receipts for the coming school year which are listed on the budget following, does not include money received from the state school support fund, which is taken from surplus accumulated from state income tax.

Budget for Junction City grade school, district 69 follows: Schedule I: Estimated receipts from delinquent taxes during fiscal year for which this budget is made \$1500.00. Estimated receipts from county school fund, \$4000.00. Estimated receipts from elementary school fund, \$2025.00. Estimated receipts from state intermediate school fund, \$484.00. Estimated receipts from elementary tuition, \$2000.00. Total \$10,069.00.

Schedule II: General fund 1. general control: clerk, \$300.00; stenographers and other office assistants, \$300.00; compulsory education and census, \$50.00; elections and publicity, \$20.00; legal service, clerk's bond, audit, etc., \$40.00. Total \$710.00.

II. Instruction, teaching. Teachers, \$14,535.00; library supplies, repairs, \$100.00; supplies (chalk, paper, etc.), \$375.00; textbooks, \$450.00; total, \$15,460.00.

III. Operation of plant: Janitor, \$1,650.00; cook, \$400.00; janitor supplies, \$350.00; fuel, \$475.00; light and power, \$250.00; water, \$72.00; telephone, \$160.00; total \$3,297.00.

IV. Maintenance and repairs: Repair and maintenance of furniture and equipment, \$100.00; floors, \$100.00; other expenses, \$175.00; total \$375.00.

V. Auxiliary agencies: personal service (doctor, nurse, etc.), \$100.00; supplies, \$15.00; total \$115.00.

VI. Fixed charges: Insurance, \$380.72; boiler inspection, \$5.00; compensation, \$30.00; total \$395.72.
