After refreshing minds of the listeners with a bit of history on public opinion polls and events arousing public opinion, Knight William stated "... at any given time or place may be a guide to future navigation of stormy seas. Although we should hope that leadership will not continue to read them merely as charts of shoals and headlands to be avoided, but as a challenge to some major engineering feat to remove those obstructions of passion and prejudice and ignorance which menace our good will voyage. One thing which we learn as editors (politicians please take note) is that most of these shoals and headlands are not as dangerous as they look. . . .

The speaker recited several personal experiences over 30 years of "covering" the news, receiving letters to the editor, hearing opinions from every walk of life regarding news events and the way they are handled.

Outwardly, at least, this vast amorphous aggregation which we call the public seems to be utterly preoccupied with its own little daily concerns. It does not seem to want to be bothered about weighty things like the future. It wants bread and it likes butter. Mr. Tugman said. Nevertheless, these are the same Americans who give sons to the cause, buy bonds, accept rationing without too much grumbling, he added. "You say they cannot be indifferent to this complicated future in which their children must live. Nor do I believe they are," the speaker stated, continuing:

"The problem of the public mind, in this world surge toward democracy does not end with measuring its variations from time to time, but in finding the means to get and hold some measure of its constant attention."

There is a suggestion as to the course which future education must take, and the development of our schools, it was said, the speaker pointing out: "I think it is generally agreed that the notion is all wrong which says that education ends with the awarding of a diploma or the conferring of a degree. . . . In a world which hopes to achieve peace and prosperity through the force of an enlightened and intelligent public opinion, there is a call for education to help young and old understand themselves and the world in which they live." Going then into hints of the post-war period, Mr. Tugman said "The problem of the post-war years is not merely to measure the tides of public opinion from time to time, as accurately as possible, but to take timely and courageous measures wherever the forces of intolerance and ignorance threaten to take hold. The public mind is not immune to reason. Very often it is a race to see whether reason or unreason gets its attention first."

In his concluding remarks, Editor Tugman said: "The public mind! It is a fertile soil. Such ideas as Magna Charta and the Declaration of Independence with its 'life, liberty, and pursuit of happiness' have taken deep root in it. Not even Hitler and the German army can impair these roots. We sometimes say that the great masters of statecraft and philosophy and all the arts have labored for the few. Nevertheless, their contributions have always been ideas which have had tremendous cumulative effect. So it will be with all the planning and striving for world union and world peace. We who deal constantly with the public mind have no illusions that the path will be easy or short, but, the goal will be reached."

The path to the public mind begins at home, another variation of the old theme that good government begins at home, Mr. Tugman
