

Three Scout Summer Camps Are Planned

The boy scouts of the Wallamet area council will have their choice of three scout camps this summer according to J. R. Bruckart, council camp chairman. Two of the camps will be recreational training camps and the third will be a work camp.

"Camp Lucky Boy on Blue River will open on July 4 for three one week periods and can accommodate about eighty scouts each week," said Bruckart. "This will be followed by two weeks at Camp Wolf Creek and then by four weeks of harvest camp," he added.

Camp Lucky Boy on Blue River in eastern Lane county is the established camp of this council having been operated since 1930. It is a fine mountain camp fully equipped for every kind of Scout activity. In past years scouts have attended Camp Lucky Boy from over the entire six counties of the local boy scout council. As in the past the camp is open to scouts of the entire council, but to ease problems of transportation, Camp Wolf Creek, located at the junction of Wolf Creek and Little River in Douglas county will be operated for two weeks from July 25 to August 8 especially for the Scouts in Douglas, Coos and Curry counties.

A special Boy Scout harvest camp is also planned for the period from August 8th to September 5th. A fine location east of Springfield has been secured and the camp will accommodate 50 scouts plus leaders for a month of bean picking. "This will be a typical boy scout camp with every possible facility for swimming, camping, and regular boy scout work in addition to a six hour working day in the beans," said K. A. Wells, scout executive.

Scouts may attend each of the three camps on the basis of weekly periods. In each case they may come to camp for periods of from one week to the duration of the camp. In the harvest camp, scouts will be paid the standard rate for their work in the fields. Each camp will be fully staffed and operated under the direction of the scout executive or assistant scout executive.

tion of departments supported by the city and county on co-operative bases. Councilman Brownson maintained that the city paid its rightful share of county taxes and should not, therefore, have to help the county pay expenses on special projects and upkeep.

A number of the councilmen agreed and advanced the belief that through such procedure, the city is "paying double" for support of some city-county agencies. Among departments discussed were those of the county doctor, juvenile officer, comfort station, and others.

O. K. Burrell, citizen member of the committee, called for "critical scrutiny of expenditures" and asked that the citizens' group be given a fuller idea of what monies are to be spent for.

Engineer's Budget Eyed
The office of the engineer and building inspector received its share of comments. The wartime building slump, it was declared, has caused a decline in the work of the building inspector. According to Councilman Brownson, there is not enough work in building inspection at present to warrant the expense. He asked for some change in the building inspector's duties during the war.

Councilman E. A. Barrette said that the men on the building staff were "victims of circumstance." Mayor Large, who had been elected committee chairman, reminded the group that the planning commission probably would ask for help from this department in working out its post-war plans. No action was taken, since the group had agreed to make the meeting primarily one of examination of the budget.

This group decided, however, to allot only \$1200 (instead of \$2265) for electrical inspection, since this work is done on a part-time basis by a water board employee, and this expense in some months during the past year has been as low as \$60. The group briefly considered handling of building inspection under a similar set-up, with some workman doing jobs on a part-time or on-call basis.

Among miscellaneous items pondered were a request from

District 10 of the Lane county defense council for \$2,000, and a request for \$1,000 to recruit and maintain a municipal band, which was listed as "essential in sustaining the morale of the public in times of stress" in the letter of Robert E. Keefe, band secretary.

Widest smile of the evening came when one of the citizen members asked, "What's this \$3,000 for a humane society?" The councilmen explained that the money would go to the Lane county humane society for setting up an adequate organization for dog control within the city. The sum will be "refunded" to the city in great part, councilmen believe by revenues from dog licenses and funds from the state.

The fire and police departments submitted not only regular "departmental requests" but also special requests of the respective chiefs. The special requests differed only in regard to salaries, which in some cases would be increased up to 25 per cent.

That of the police department would show no total budget increase, since it is based on cutting the staff by two men (which the department is short at present), and applying their salaries on those of a smaller staff.

Neither the police nor fire department predict any rapid build-up of their staffs to peacetime numbers. Increasing the present salaries, it was believed, would help both departments to increase working efficiency, to build up their personnel to the "experienced" level and to encourage the employees to stay on the job.

The second budget meeting will be held Friday evening from 7:30 to 9:30 in the council chamber.

Liberators Bomb Japs On Wake Island

WASHINGTON, May 18.—(AP)—Army heavy bombers, ranging more than 1,000 miles from their base, attacked Japanese installations on Wake Island Saturday, the navy reported today.

Navy communique number 382, said:

"Central Pacific:
"1. On May 15th, a force of army Liberators (Consolidated B-24) heavy bombers attacked Japanese installations on Wake Island. Bad weather prevented observation of results. United States planes were engaged by 22 Japanese Zero fighters of which two were definitely destroyed and one additional was probably destroyed."

"South Pacific: (All dates are east longitude)
"2. On May 16th, during the morning, navy and marine troops dauntless (Douglas SBD) dive bombers, escorted by army Liberators (Bell P-39) and Wildcat (Grumman F4F) fighters, bombed and strafed Japanese installations at Rekata Bay, Sant Isabel Island."

121 German Planes Destroyed in 3 Days

LONDON, May 18.—(AP)—The United States Eighth air force announced today that it had destroyed 121 German planes in three days of operations last week.

American losses in the same period were 37, including 24 heavies, 10 medium bombers and three fighters.

U. S. War Casualty Total Now 83,215

WASHINGTON, May 18.—(AP)—Grand total of casualties for all branches of the armed services since Pearl Harbor now stands at 83,215, it was disclosed today.

Of the total, 56,942 are army casualties, classified as follows: Dead, 6,078; wounded, 12,277; missing, 24,345; prisoners, 14,244.

The navy department reported a total of 26,273 casualties for the navy, marines and coast guard, classified by services as follows: Marines: Dead, 1,565; wounded, 2,219; missing, 9,891; prisoners, 763.

Navy: Dead, 5,577; wounded, 2,219; missing, 9,891; prisoners, 1,541.

Coast Guard: Dead, 78; wounded, 22; missing, 158; prisoners, 0.

Davies Takes Look At Stalingrad Ruins

MOSCOW, May 18.—(AP)—Joseph E. Davies, special envoy of President Roosevelt to Premier Stalin, was reported today to have flown from Kuibyshev to Stalingrad for a quick look at the famous Volga bastion and then returned to Kuibyshev. He is expected in Moscow shortly.

ed at long range but they dodged the heavy U. S. fighters which were unable to close with them, a U. S. communique said.

Boston bombers of the RAF raided the French airport at Abbeville and escorting Spitfires destroyed a Focke-Wulf, the air ministry said, earlier. Typhoons bombed a plane dispersal area at Poix,

losing five craft to heavy anti-aircraft fire.

British bombers, returning again last night to the air offensive on Europe, attacked targets in southern Germany, fighters swept northern France and Belgium, and coastal aircraft damaged five ships in an enemy convoy.

The coastal command planes attacked a convoy off the Dutch coast which was initially attacked by Beaufighters yesterday.

Two of the supply ships in a convoy of eight merchantmen and three escort vessels were left sinking and were seen to be abandoned by their crews, it was stated.

Axis radios on the continent began going from the air this morning, indicating that allied air raids were continuing to blast European strongholds by daylight.
