Canning Sugar Stamps
Become Good Monday

WASHINGTON, May 22—(AP)—Starting next Monday, stamps No. 15 and 16 in ration book one will be good for five pounds of sugar each for home canning.

The office of price administration announced a previously announced program under which home canners would have applied to local ration boards for sugar allotments.

OPA explained last night that families requiring more than 10 pounds of sugar per person for home canning may apply to local ration boards for additional allowances.

The sugar-for-canning provision does not interfere with the regular sugar rationing program, OPA said. A spokesman pointed out that stamp No. 13 would become valid June 1 to August 15 for five pounds.

Need for Newspapers
Cited by Army Officer

SPOKANE, May 22—(AP)—The service camps of America need the nation's newspapers, the public relations office of the second air force said yesterday.

Capt. Robert Emahiser called attention to an article appearing in the "Bomb-Bay Messenger," publication of the Salt Lake City air base, and said its praise of the press was typical of the air force's regard for the newspaper's place in the war effort. The article said, in part:

"The suggestion by Col. Frank W. Wright, commanding officer, that squadron commanders encourage their men to read the daily newspapers emphasizes the fact that the daily press is considered one of the most vital modern building factors available at the army air base, Salt Lake City. The 'power of the press' is no idle term when it comes to enlightening air base personnel, both officers and enlisted men."

done with the \$8,140 asked by the planning commission. City Engineer W. C. Clubb, speaking unofficially, said that the funds were for making a preliminary map and surveying with an eye toward post-war city planning and expansion on an orderly basis. He declared that his department would be unable to take any sizable share of this work in its present under-staffed position.

Commenting on a proposal to cut the building inspector from the office staff because of the war-time let-up in such inspection, Mr. Clubb maintained that in the long run the city would lose money by such a procedure. He presented figures on the working hours of the inspector which indicated that the inspector, although not giving full time to his titular duties, is far from being "under-worked" because of added work in other parts of the office and for other departments.

A letter from the county asking for \$1,000 to increase the wages of Ad Ditz, city-county juvenile officer, and to add a matron for county work on delinquency to the staff—was looked on with favor.

Brief discussion predicted that the Eugene municipal band would not receive the requested \$1,000 for organization and maintenance.

At present the city is paying \$25, plus gas and oil, for expenses of city traffic officers who use their own cars in their jobs. Orrin Brownson, one of the eight councilmen on the committee, advanced the belief that all city-owned and operated vehicles should be owned by the city.

The budget as it now stands allows funds for an assistant city recorder, which position is not filled at present, while the recorder, Cal Bryan, is in the armed forces and John Fields, the regular assistant, is acting recorder. The city department clerk now gives part time assistance in the recorder's office. The committee contended that, since in all probability, these three jobs would be carried on by two men for at least the next 12 months, either the salary of assistant recorder or of the lien clerk should be cut from the budget.

The group pondered briefly cutting the \$300 for "assistant treasurer" from the treasurer's office request. The amount was asked for as a contingency in case of illness of the treasurer, who has no assistant and who did not ask for the prospectively-allowed pay increase. Several members suggested cutting the \$300 item but raising the treasurer's wages.

The group held that it would be reasonable to cut the public library's request by \$265 to meet funds to be derived from the allowable one mill levy for this department.

Asks Street Funds
Councilman E. A. Barett urged that the street department be given \$5,000 for maintenance and repairs (as compared to \$3,000 in the last budget), which sum he deemed necessary because of the unavailability of oil for use on streets and the consequently greater departmental need for gravel.

A letter from the Lane County League of Women Voters, asking for \$1,000 for co-handling of the juvenile problem with the county sharing expenses, was read. The county has already allotted a fund for study and prevention of such delinquency.

Speed in laying out the permanent budget was urged by Mayor Large, who suggested that "30-minute speeches" be eliminated from the discussions.

The eight citizen members of the committee plan a study meeting of their own for Monday night at 7:30 in the recorder's office. The third budget committee gathering will be held Thursday night at 7:30 in the council chamber.

188th Liberty Ship**
PORTLAND, May 22—(AP)—Oregon shipbuilding corporation's 188th Liberty freighter, the R. C. Brennan, was at its outfitting dock today following its launching yesterday.

The vessel is named for a well-known northwest shipmaster who was lost with his ship in the Caribbean last fall. Brennan's widow sponsored the vessel and J. W. Brennan, port director at San Diego, Cal., brother of the late captain, was special guest.

WASHINGTON, May 22—(AP)—OPA's decision to abandon plans to require grade-labeling of the 1943 pack of canned fruits and vegetables marks the beginning as well as the end of a battle.

Advocates of grade-labeling, who have been waging a long campaign—brought to a head by wartime price controls, are ready to start anew.

They maintain that for a consumer's protection, the label on a can or other container should show the quality of the contents. OPA's compromise calls for invoices of shipments of goods to be marked as to grade, so this information would be available to the consumer through the store-keeper.

Next Monday a congressional investigating committee headed by Rep. Boren (D-Okla.) will start hearings on the whole subject of grade labeling—not confined to food.

The main points of argument come down to this:

For grade labeling—
Price control doesn't mean anything, say grade-labeling advocates, unless accompanied by certification that the goods bought at a price ceiling actually come up to the standards on which the price was based.

Against grade labeling—
Manufacturers contend that it's part of a move by "radicals" in high places to wipe out brand names entirely, with the eventual goal of using only grade markings.

Part of this argument traces to an experience with federal purchase of soap for distribution in Puerto Rico, when the agricultural marketing administration specified "no brand name."

We put this up to a man who knows a lot of the ins and outs of Washington, and he replied:

"If you had to decide on one kind of soap to go to Puerto Rico, would you pick out a certain brand, or maybe several brands? Or would you demand a certain standard and dodge the responsibility for building up the name of one or more brands?"

However, he said that for many years there have been persons in government who hold to the theory that carefully enforced standards should replace brand names entirely. These persons, he said, figure that instead of spending money for advertising brands, the manufacturers should reduce the cost to consumers.

Their theories, of course, run across the grain of the view that competition among producers of branded products makes for lower prices, better service and high quality.

To be sure, manufacturers sometimes, as in the case of war model goods, decline to put brand names on the products... or agree not to... because they say the war model isn't up to the quality on which they've built reputations.

The argument which won the OPA change of heart was that grade-labeling of canned goods at this time would require additional labor and expense and curtail production. The canners agreed that prices should vary according to quality.

Clip this rationing calendar and attach it to your ration books. (Register-Guard, May 23, 1943.)

RATION BOOK NO. 2
May 23—Red stamp J became valid. E, F, G, and H also valid at this time. All expire May 31 at midnight.

May 24—Blue stamps K, L, and M become valid. All expire July 7 at midnight.

June 7—Blue stamps G, H, and J expire at midnight.

COFFEE
May 30—Stamp 23, Book 1, for one pound, expires at midnight.

SUGAR
May 24—Stamps 15 and 16, Book 1, each become valid for five pounds for home canning. Both expire Oct. 31.

May 31—Stamp 12, Book 1, for 5 pounds, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
May 21—No. 5 stamps in A book expire at midnight.
May 22—No. 6 stamps in A book, each good for four gallons, become valid through June 25.

TIRES
May 31—Cars with C books must have tires inspected by this date; B books by June 30. First must have been made by March 31; subsequent inspections within every six-month period thereafter but at least 90 days apart. September 30 next tire inspection deadline for A books. Same basic rules as for passenger cars apply to motorcycle D books.

SHOES
June 15—Stamp 17, Book 1 for one pair of shoes, expires at midnight. Stamps interchangeable within the family.

June 16—Stamp 18, Book 1, for one pair of shoes, becomes valid.

FUEL OIL
September 30—Period 5 coupons valid March 28 through September 30. Heating coupons—one unit, value ten gallons; ten units, 100 gallons.
