38,300 Killed in Auto Accidents During War

CHICAGO, May 29.—(P)—Since Pearl Harbor, America has amassed a traffic death toll of 38,300, of whom 25,500 were workers, the National Safety council reported today, and said the figures were evidence that wartime restrictions have proved no cure-all for manpower-drawing traffic accidents.

The peak traffic danger period, the council added, will begin with the Memorial day holiday. It called upon all public officials, traffic agencies and citizens to unite to make Memorial day the occasion for starting a summer-long campaign to reduce traffic accidents.

The nation's toll for the first four months of 1943 was 6880, a 35 per cent drop from the 10,250 killed in the same period last year and 39 per cent below the 10,880 deaths in the pre-war January-April period of 1941.

In April the traffic death total was 1600—27 per cent below the 2180 in April, 1942, and 39 per cent below the 2630 in April, 1941. The April figures confirmed previous indications that traffic deaths are becoming stabilized at a level approximately 40 per cent below the pre-war year of 1941, the council said.

Minneapolis and St. Paul led cities of 250,000 or more population in traffic death reductions. St. Paul cut deaths in the first four months from 17 to 8, at 71 per cent drop. Minneapolis halved its 16 to 8.

Milwaukee continued to lead the four-month registration death rate rankings for cities of more than 500,000 population with a rate of only 2.7 deaths for each 10,000 registered vehicles. Washington and Detroit followed with rates of 3.3 and 3.6, respectively.

Among leaders, ranked by registration death rates, were: 10,000 to 25,000 population: Klamath Falls, Ore.

Race Discrimination Charged to Union

SEATTLE, May 29.—(P)—A young negro woman, Mrs. Ruby Black, alleged yesterday that she was refused admission to the aeronautical mechanics union local after graduating from an NYA training course, but was issued a work permit for employment at Boeing aircraft for a fee of \$3.50 a month.

The allegations were contained in a suit filed against the union and Boeing asking a court order against "continuation of a practice of prejudice" and against the union's monthly collection from first-year colored workers.

Mrs. Black said she lost her job after tendering the union only \$1.50, which she said was the monthly payment of white women.

Informed of the suit, William Bullwinkle, union secretary-treasurer, explained in a statement to the press that the payment of workers ineligible for union membership actually was less than that of members because the latter have a \$25 initiation fee plus \$1.50 a month dues, a total of \$4 for the first year, while non-members are paying a total of \$42.

After the first year, he said, the payment is \$1.50 monthly for all.

"In order for us to take in the colored people," he explained, "a referendum would have to be held on a national basis by the international association of machinists, with which the aero mechanics are affiliated."

He said that negotiations with Paul J. Raver, present administrator, were going smoothly until Undersecretary of Interior Wirtz intervened.
