The Nazis are making lightning strikes at the Russians, now here and now there, and the Reds are replying in kind—each feeling out the other fellow's positions to learn disposition of troops and find weak spots. Also to keep up the war of nerves which always precedes an offensive.

for major action. Each gives the other credit of intending to launch an all-out offensive—and likely both are right.

Hitler in particular has been showing signs the past few days of getting his war-machine trimmed for a possible last huge gamble against the Bolsheviks. However, he is proceeding cautiously so as not to get caught with an allied invasion of western Europe while he is in a life and death struggle with Stalin.

The Russian's first problem is to determine where the Anglo-American allies are going to attack, and he must be burning a lot of incense to that much talked of intuition of his. He has another possible clue for his mystery today in the reports from Spain that there's a massing of allied cargo vessels, transports and warships at Gibraltar.

Does this indicate an attack in the Mediterranean theater? It certainly could mean that very easily. However, that's Hitler's worry. As remarked before in this column, if the all highest decides that the first allied assault is coming against Italian territory and not through France, he may launch an assault on Russia forthwith. An invasion of western Europe is the one that would place him in the greatest immediate peril.

Hitler is estimated by observers to have something like 3,000,000 men on the Russian front. That represents a terrific weight, if he still has the equipment to match it. His objective in another offensive, of course, would be to render the Red army impotent before he has to rush to defend himself against the other allies.

There's a small likelihood that the Nazi chief can show anything like his former striking power. His losses in material the past year have been recorded in Moscow reports as colossal. For instance, dispatches from the Russian front state that during the month of May the Germans lost more than 2,000 warplanes in the eastern theater.

And far worse than the destruction of the machines is the loss of the Nazi airmen involved. Heavy depletion of its ranks of trained pilots is one of the Luftwaffe's greatest weaknesses.

Summer Recreation Program Will Open

The summer program of the city playground and recreation commission will open Saturday night, June 12, with a dance from 8 to 11 at Roosevelt junior high school which will be open to all 'teen-age boys and girls.

Decision to have regular dances for youths of these ages was made the past week by Miss Florence Alden, commission director, and a "recreation council" representing local high schools, which met to discuss summer plans.

The council is making all arrangements, including music, refreshments, and "supervisors." The plan is to have a dance every Saturday night of the summer, alternating between Roosevelt and Wilson junior high.

A recreation preference questionnaire has been sent through the high schools and junior-highs to determine types of activities, of interest and value to boys and girls of these ages, which will be emphasized. A similar questionnaire was used in the grade schools last year. On the basis of returns from both of these, the 1943 summer program is being made up for elementary, junior high, and high school students, and adults.

Centers to be open this season, for those six years of age and older, are Wilson, afternoons and evenings; University afternoons; Roosevelt, evenings. Opening date for these will be Wednesday, June 16.

The University pool in Gerlinger hall will be available the entire summer. Opening date is Monday, June 21. Hours and fees will be announced later.

The commission will also have use of the tennis courts on the campus and at the fairgrounds. Tennis, recreative playing, lessons, and tournaments will be program features.

Excellent facilities at the two junior high schools and University high, for both indoor and outdoor activities, is enabling the recreation commission to offer an unusually wide and varied program for all ages, Miss Alden reports.

Evening work will be based on interests of adults and boys and girls who may be working during the day. The afternoon program will offer activities for all ages of young people.

A special effort is being made to have clean, attractive, shady places for the play of small children, aged six or older. The cafeteria at Wilson and the music room

and shady porches at University high are ideally suited to singing, games, folk dancing, handicraft, Mads Alden believes.

Leaders who are skilled in handling small children's activities

have been secured for supervision. An especially trained handicraft teacher is planning a program, adapted to the respective skill and interest levels. Names of leaders for all groups are to be released shortly.

Students on the new recreation council and schools they represent are: Arnold Anderson and Joyce Davis, Eugene high; Bob Martin and Gene Harvey, University high; Dick Baker and Murie Means, Roosevelt; John Quiner Jr., and Helen Wright, Woodrow Wilson.

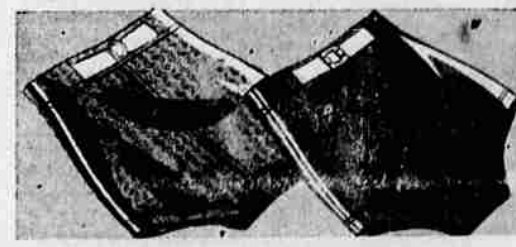
